"Nicky" Arnstein Waiting With Actress Wife in Prosecutor's Office to Surrender



After eluding the police since February 12, Jules W. (Nicky) Arnstein, sought on two continents as the alleged head of a band of swindlers who, by connivance with bank and brokerage messengers, are said to have stolen from \$1,500,000 to \$5,000,000 in bonds and other securities from Wall Street firms, went to New York from Pittsburgh on May 15 and surrendered to the district attorney. He went to the prosecutor's office with his wife, known on the stage as Fanny Brice.

He is shown with her there "waiting for somebody to show up," as he put it, and arrest him. The day he surrendered, the annual New York police parade was held and Arnstein's automobile was held up several times by the lines of blue-coats while he was on his way to receive himself up. When he passed the reviewing stand in Fifth Avenue, he rose and waved his hat to the police official whom he had fooled for more than three months.

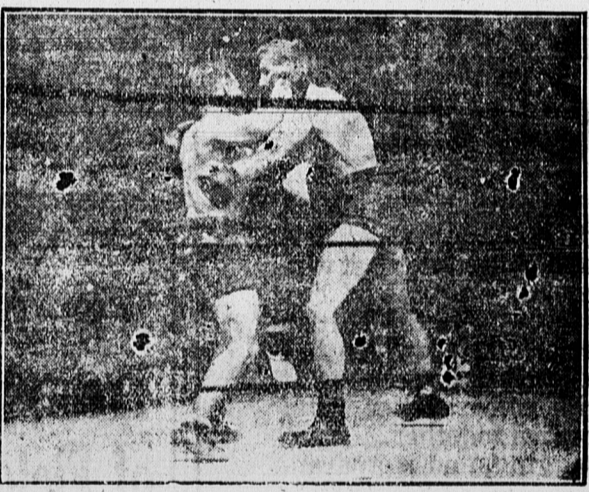
