NEW YORK, Aug. 25 (AP)—There was laughter and tears and treasured memories in the historic Polo grounds today as more than 35,000 spectators turned out for an unforgettable baseball and vaudeville show that raised \$800,000 in war bonds.

For the occasion seven of the 12 living members of Baseball's Hall of Fame were present in uniform and took part in a tableau which Walter Johnson pitched again to Babe Ruth and the fat old Bambino lifted a home run into the upper deck of the right-field stands.

With Ruth at bat, George Sisler at first base, Eddie Collins at second, bow-legged Honus Wagner at short, Tris Speaker in centre field and Connie Mack waving a scorecard. Their ranks were filled out by other famous players of the game, including Fred McGriff, an catching, Frank Frisch and Jack Duffy Lewis in left field and base, Duffy Lewis in left field and Jack Murray in right.

Womens Army Corps Observes 2nd Anniversary

Two years ago on Aug. 29, 1941, the first call went out to women in Canada that a new field in which they could serve shoulder-to-shoulder with soldiers in the war, was open to them. This was the Canadian Women's Army Corps and on Sunday observes the second year of its founding.

In answering that call, no women showed more readiness to serve than those of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island. The first small trickle of recruits from the two provinces comprising Military District No. 8 has expanded into a flood and today there is a steady stream of young women flowing to recruiting offices to join the Corps.

These recruits are needed urgently for important activities in the front and each recruit means that a soldier is released for more active duty in fighting the Axis.

Figures show that a year ago C.W.A.C. personnel in Military District No. 8 numbered seven citizens and 283 other ranks. At the year's end the number has risen to 10 officers and 467 other ranks and it had mounted to 33 officers and 800 other ranks.

In the past year more than 800 young women have signed up to serve side-by-side with the Dominion's men in this district, and in addition a recent intake of 100,000 new recruits has already brought more than 100 girls to Canada to join the C.W.A.C.

Army Doctors Fight Malaria

MELBOURNE, Aug. 25 (CP)—An intensified campaign against malaria is being launched by American and Australian medical authorities in New Guinea. The main object is to educate troops in taking precautions, and it follows weeks of work by anti-malarial squads in clearing out mosquito larva from camp areas.

Although this work has already made considerable progress in bad malarial areas like Milne Bay, a review of the past year's work in this theatre shows that more man days were lost from malaria than from any other disease.

Elementary instruction in fighting malaria will be given to troops before coming to New Guinea, and they will be drilled in simple preventive measures, such as dosing with quinine or atabrine, covering of legs and arms and use of mosquito repellents in the evening, when mosquitoes are most active, and spraying of tents with DDT, DDT and kerosene spraying. Sanitation work is already being done in New Guinea and it is not considered possible to eradicate the disease entirely, but it is hoped it can be kept in check and the proportion of casualties in battle areas can be considerably reduced.

An appeal to troops from Lt.-Gen. George C. Kennedy, commander of Allied Air Forces, tells troops bluntly that 2,000,000 people die annually of malaria and that 100,000,000 cases a year have been recorded in India. He announces the intention of the command to do its utmost in helping to control the spread of the disease in the interest of efficiency of the fighting forces in the Southwest Pacific.

An Australian Army order emphasizes that control of malaria is a military rather than a medical problem, that responsibility for malaria rests on the commanding officer of every unit and every individual soldier and that the disease can be controlled by proven measures under strict military discipline.

"There are millions in India, Africa and China," it said, "who have never known anything but malnutrition and semi-starvation, and it is rash to assume those people will welcome the proposals of the planners of plenty."

Even the more tasks of the C.W.A.C. are imposing in their variety and scope. The girls are counsellors, photographers, draughtswomen, accountants, painters, electricians, hairdressers, laboratory assistants, X-ray technicians, wireless operators, postal assistants and armourers, to mention some of the more unusual occupations.

In offices the "Cwacs" have taken over almost every type of clerical and administrative work. They are stenographers; they test the night vision of soldiers who must be able to see in the dark; they drive staff cars, trucks and jeeps.

Despite this rapid growth, many more young women are needed to fill vacancies in home war establishments created by the war's increasing demands for men. In this district alone, since Feb. 1, the Army has asked for 1,000 C.W.A.C.'s to fill various jobs, but the demand is so much greater than the number of recruits that 700 positions remain to be filled.

In observance of the second anniversary of the Corp's founding, the detachments at Halifax, Aldershot, Yarmouth, Shelburne, Sydney and New Glasgow will hold church parades.
