At this meeting arrangements will be made for the holding of a local Seed Fair at Souris next Spring and the neighboring Institutes are invited to send delegates. Prof. Ross will be present and hold classes in seed judging. As it is sometime since an Agricultural meeting was held in Souris it is hoped that this meeting will be very largely attended and that everyone will be on hand promptly at 1.30 p. m.
—The marriage took place March 29th, at the residence of Fred Doroniec, Vancouver, B. C., of Miss Nina Katherine Craig of Charlottetown, to Stewart Tiche of Central Park, Vancouver. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Mr. Peacock, pastor of the Presbyterian church, Central Park. The bride was tastefully attired in a gown of blue silk. Before leaving for Vancouver, Miss Craig was presented with an address referred to by a beautiful cut glass dish and set of table linen by her fellow workers in the Guild and Sunday School of the Presbyterian Church there. —An inspiring talk on good seeds was given by Prof. Theo. Ross to the farmers of Kinkora on Monday evening, April 10th. His talk was of such a nature as to fill his audience with enthusiasm of the healthiest kind, the sequel of which was the establishment of a very promising Farmers' Institute at Kinkora. Upon receipt of the charter for the establishment of the Institute a meeting was called on the evening of the 24th inst. for the purpose of organization. The gratifying roll of 61 paid-up members was announced by the chairman, Rev. J. J. McDonald, at the beginning of the meeting. A few remarks from the chairman explanatory of the aims and objects of an Institute were followed by a general discussion of important topics, for instance, the disposal of the funds of the society, the care and selection of seed, the improvement of dairy cattle, etc. These discussions were laid over to be resumed at a general meeting to be held on Tuesday evening, May 2nd, at 5 p. m., when the president hoped to be able to submit samples and prices on good seed from the seed dealers of the Province, and all the members interested are invited to present their orders for seeds. The following directors were appointed—Rev. J. J. McDonald, John T. Murphy, Walter Ronaghan, Wm. Clark, J. J. Hughes, Thomas L. Shreenan, Edmund Shreenan, John M. Kelly, Thos. Smith. The meeting then adjourned. At a meeting of the directors held immediately after, the following officers were appointed for the ensuing year: President, Rev. J. J. McDonald; Vice-President, John T. Murphy; Secretary-Treasurer, Walter Ronaghan. The success of dairying at Kinkora and of every other project in lines of agriculture, where co-operation has been tried in that section as well as the enthusiasm manifested in the initial stage of their latest venture is a fair augury of what the results of their Institute will be.

TO INCREASE FACILITIES AT PORT OF LONDON

LONDON, April 25—The first instalment of the work for the improvement of the port of London, under the act by which the government took over all the great docks and vested them in the control of the port of London authority, is about to be taken in hand. The whole undertaking will occupy years and is destined to place London on an equality with Liverpool, Southampton and other ports in respect to modern equipment. A commencement is to be made with the construction of the South

Albert dock at an expense of nearly \$12,000,000. This dock is designed to accommodate the largest ships afloat or projected. The entrance lock will have a maximum length of 1,000 feet, a width of 110 feet and a depth of water of 48 feet. The entrance will be 850 feet deep, corresponding practically in accommodation with the entrance.
Under the complete plan it is proposed to straighten the Thames River just below the pool by moving some of the present docks from the north to the south side of the river, thus shortening the river passage.

ST. JOHN, April 25—The bark Emma R. Smith, which is ready to clear today for New York with a lumber cargo, was arrested at the instance of the Costello Chandlery Co., of Mobile. The sum is said to be \$2,400.

AFTER TEA SUES FOR \$52,000
NEW YORK, April 24—Asserting that he was a victim of a plot to discredit his testimony in a suit in which fraud was alleged against Moses Esberg and others, David Uhren has filed a suit in the Supreme Court against Mr. Esberg, his wife, Carrie F. Esberg; Miss Helen Esberg and David L. Sohn, who is engaged to marry Miss Esberg. The action is for false arrest, and he asks \$52,000 damages.
Mr. Uhren said that a short time after he began the suit, which was in relation to a transaction concerning real estate at Ninety-second street and Broadway, he met Mrs. Esberg, and she invited him to visit her at the Holland House. She declared they could probably settle the suit over tea and cakes he said.
Mr. Uhren asserts that he kept the appointment, and visited the Esbergs on March 6. He was eating cake and drinking tea, he said, when suddenly the door opened and in walked two physicians, a nurse and a policeman. Some one said, according to the plaintiff: "This is the crazy man. Take him away."
He was taken to the Bellevue Hospital, and kept there until nearly nine o'clock, when he was removed to the Night Court. There, he said he was placed in the prisoner's pen until his turn for arraignment came. Magistrate Fresh declared that the complaint was insufficient, and he was sent back to the pen and kept there until one o'clock in the morning, while a new complaint was being prepared. After a short hearing Magistrate Fresh discharged him, he said.
Mr. Uhren declares that the whole proceeding was a plot to discredit his testimony in the fraud suit. The defendants deny Mr. Uhren's charges.
