Nash. The concert and ple social at Orwell Cove was very largely attended Monday evening. A large sum was realized to be devoted to repairs to the hall. THE GUARDIAN regrets to learn that the young daughter of Mr. Thomas Brehaut, of Alexandra, had her leg broken by being thrown off a sleigh while coasting several days ago. THE Minto arrived in port yesterday at 10 o'clock with the following cargo: 1 car carriages, 1 car agricultural implements, 1 car axes, 2 cars way freight. There were 17 passengers and 90 bags mail. THE Recital of Sacred music, vocal and instrumental, under direction of Prof. Earle, in St. Pauls Church last night was well patronized, the church being filled. The solos were of a high order and with one or two exceptions where the performers were suffering from a cold the program was adhered to. The numbers taken by the quartette were capitally rendered. MESSRS. R. E. Spillett and A. J. Biffin returned yesterday after an absence of 7 weeks during which they visited England and Scotland. In conversation with Mr. Spillett he stated that after 13 days they landed in London and afterwards visited Brighton, Glasgow, Manchester. Mr. Biffin went to Brighton to visit his old home. Mr. Spillett visited cheese depots at places mentioned and inspected Island cheese stored. He found it good compared with Ontario and other sections with the exception of flavor, which experts there attribute to the poor milk rather than to defective making. There is a great deal of cheese on the market, Mr. Spillett thinks, however it will rapidly clean up, but buyers will not realize in proportion to price paid. He found that Island cheese made in a good impression on the home market but more care must be exercised by the patrons in regard to the supplying of good milk to produce flavor. The prompt emptying of whey cans must be insisted upon. Messrs Spillett and Biffin are delighted with the trip.

THE committee who have charge of the basket social and entertainment which is to take place in North Bedouque Hall, Wednesday next, promise a good time to all who may favor it with their presence. THE evidence in the Huse vs. Simmons, Chancery suit, which has occupied the Court since Tuesday last was concluded on Monday. The argument of counsel began yesterday and Judge Hodgson will give his decision to-day. THE members of the Darnley and Sea View C. E. Society gathered at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Benj. Donalds, Sea View, on Saturday evening last when a very enjoyable and profitable time was spent. The early part of the evening was occupied in games and social chat, and after a sumptuous repast the remainder of the evening was passed in discussing future plans of C. E. work. A number of changes were made in the general routine work which will no doubt be helpful to the society. After the singing of the Christian Endeavor parting hymn, "God be with you till we meet again," the company departed with pleasant memories of an evening well spent and with kind thoughts toward their host and hostess. A STRANGE looking runaway happened in Summerside Monday afternoon. While Mr. James Goodwin of Bedouque, was driving across the Railway track at the east end of the town, one of the runners of his sleigh caught in the rail which caused an upset. The horse ran dragging Mr. Goodwin as far as the freight shed where he let go of the reins. There is entirely too much of this sort of conduct tolerated at public gatherings throughout the Island to the great disgust of the majority of the people who attend them and it is absurd to think that a few foolish, intoxicated people and their associates be allowed to disturb a meeting and prevent those who go there and pay to hear what is to be given or said at those entertainments. Mr. McLean's address was a masterpiece, one of the most eloquent speakers we have had and delighted everyone who heard him. Miss Blanch Craig was the accompanist. The songs of Kenny, Ryan and Misses Bentley and Tuplin were excellent. Miss Ratray's and Mr. Flood's numbers were also excellent.

Rev. Geo. W. Fisher, of Moncton, formerly of Tryon, will attend the Ecumenical Council to be held in London next September. BEFORE the Natural History and Antiquarian Society last evening Dr. Richard Johnson delivered a closely reasoned and scholarly address on Life considered from the standpoints of science and of Scripture. He showed that while science had investigated with infinite pains the functions and operations of organic life down to its minutest and simple forms, it had utterly failed to account for its origin and had even failed to tell us in intelligible words what life is. Various features of this valuable lecture were afterwards touched upon by Dr. Taylor, Mr. Percy Pope and Mr. McCready, all of whom expressed their great delight in the rich intellectual treat that had been afforded them.
