McLean, of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, has been apprised of the death of his son, Lieut. C. G. McLean, on April 9 last. Lieut. McLean was killed in action while serving with his unit, Vancouver battalion with a splendid record of heavy fighting. He has seen service in practically every battle from 1916, and was among the Canadian officers who accompanied Gen. Victor Williams on the reconnoitering expedition which ended in the General's capture by the Germans. Lieut. McLean was 33 years of age, and before the war made his home in Vancouver.

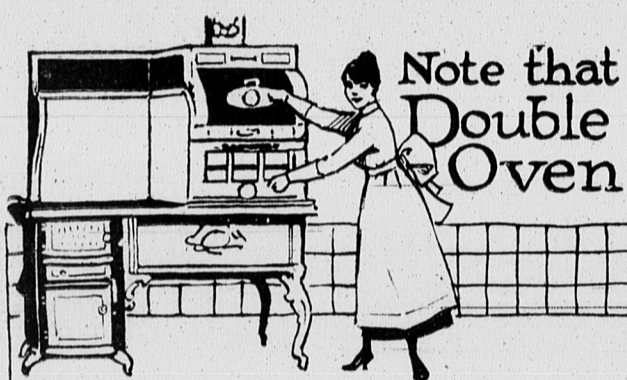
