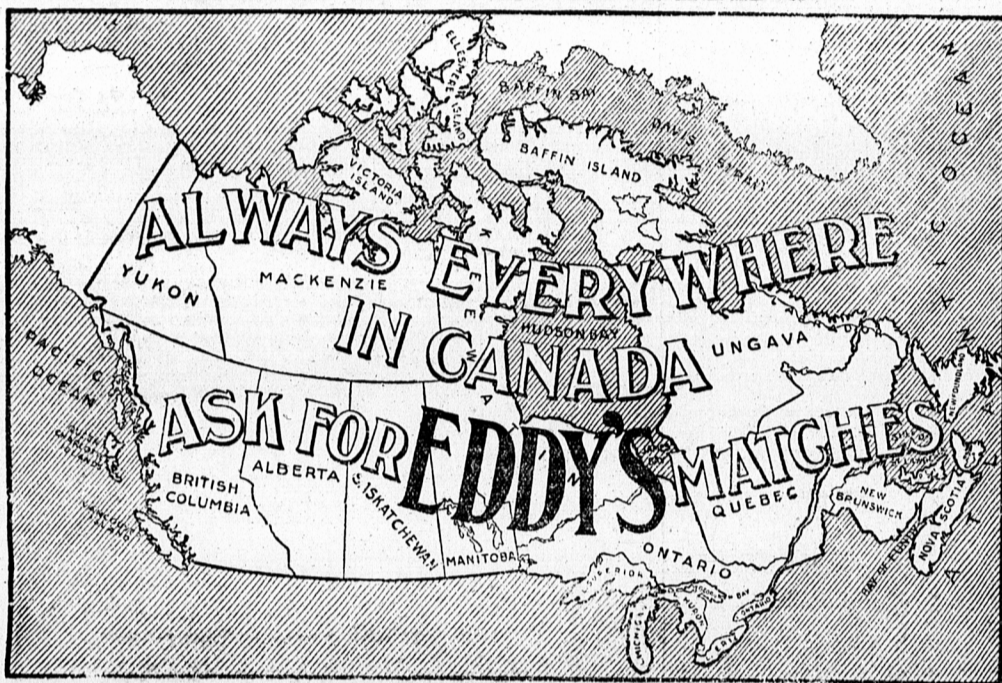

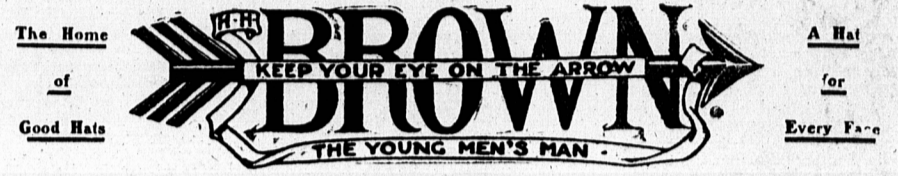

## ROSEBERRY CHIEF HOST AT THE CORONATION

LONDON, Mar. 24—A joint committee of the lords and commons of 1911 has been formed to entertain the representatives of the Dominion Parliament at the coronation. The Rt. Hon. Earl of Roseberry, K. G., is chairman and the headquarters of the committee are at the Imperial Institute, S. W.

A resume of the work of the committee, done and proposed is contained in a circular sent out by Lord Roseberry. It reads as follows:

"Towards the close of the sitting of Parliament in July 1910, a proposal was set on foot by a committee consisting of members of both houses of Parliament, of various political opinions, that a certain number of members of the overseas dominion parliaments should be invited to visit this country as guests during the period covering the coronation of His Majesty King George.

"As the sitting of parliament was drawing to a close when the above-mentioned committee met, it was impossible at that time to do more than appoint a small executive committee to carry out the preliminary arrangements. The members of this committee approached the lord chancellor, the speaker, the prime minister, the leader of the opposition, and the secretary of state for the colonies, and having obtained their approval of the idea it was arranged that confidential communications should be made through the colonial office to the governors of the various dominions, in order to ascertain whether the proposal would be likely to prove acceptable overseas. Favorable replies were received from all the dominions.

"Owing to the dissolution of Parliament, and the sudden illness of the then chairman of this committee (Lord Onslow), the issue of the formal invitations was unavoidably delayed, but cables have now been despatched inviting representatives from the overseas legislatures to be the guests of the members of both houses of parliament in London, from June 17 to July 1, in the following proportions, viz, 18 from Canada, 18 from Austria, 12 from South Africa; 8 from New Zealand, and 2 from Newfoundland is being left to the legislatures themselves to select the members to form the delegations. It may be added that the commonwealth parliament if Austria has already voted the passage money for its 18 representatives.

"Application has been made for seats to be allotted in Westminster Abbey to all the 58 members of the delegations to view the ceremony of the King's coronation, and there is good reason to believe that the application will be successful. Rooms have been taken for the period men-

tioned at the Waldorf Hotel, and it is hoped later on to extend a further invitation to the representatives from overseas to stay another period of one week, from July 2 in order to enable them to visit some of the more important towns in the United Kingdom, one or two of which have already expressed their desire for such a visit.

"The committee regret they have not found it possible to extend the formal invitations to the wives and daughters of the overseas delegates, have intimated that if any member should wish to bring his wife or a daughter, any information reaches the committee by a certain date at the number of ladies attending, hotel accommodation will be provided for a wife or a daughter in respect of each member.

"The present committee has carried thru the arrangements so far it is clearly necessary to form a general committee for the reception of the distinguished overseas guests, which shall be as appreciative as possible of the two houses of parliament and thus give point and effect to an occasion which will not only afford a significant manifestation of imperial unity, but is certain to be notable in the history of the coronation of our sovereign."

## TEARFUL DISASTER IN NEW YORK CITY.

NEW YORK, March 27—One hundred and forty persons—nine-tenths of them Jews and Italian girls from the East side—were crushed to death on the pavements or smothered in the smoke or shrivelled up to a crisp in a factory fire on Saturday afternoon in the worst disaster New York has known since the steamship General Slocum was burned in 1904.

141 bodies had been removed from ruins up to midnight, and seven of the fatally injured had died in the hospitals.

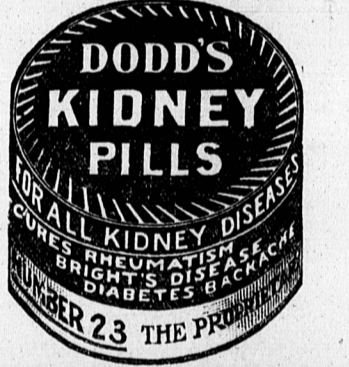
## CAPTAIN DIES; SHIP IS HELPLESS

HONOLULU, March 24.—With her captain dead and mourned by his widow in the cabin, a scanty supply of food on board, and without a correct reckoning of her position, the American barkentine James Johnson was sighted flying signals of distress one hundred miles off this port by the steamer Persia, which arrived today from Hong Kong.

A boat from the Persia was sent to board the almost hopeless vessel, the officers of which reported that Captain Carl Jensen died of heart failure on January 13th, that the ship's bearings had been lost, and that the stock of provisions was almost exhausted.

After the barkentine's larder had been replenished by the Persia and her first mate informed of her position, the acting commander decided to proceed to Honolulu unaided.

The James Johnson has on board a cargo of coal from Newcastle, N. S. W., consigned to San Francisco. She is owned by the Charles Nelson company of that city, and carries a crew of about twenty-five men.
