## Germans Should Join Russians

## WARSAW STILL HOLDS OUT AGAINST ENVELOPING FOES

### Poles Contesting Every Inch of Ground Against Heavy Odds. Bolsheviki Report Capture of City but this is Denied.

LONDON, August 17.—Pierce fighting with the issue still in doubt was in progress on three sides of Warsaw when the latest dispatches were filed from the Polish capital yesterday. A Bolsheviki claim, issued by the Commissary of the Fourth Army at Vilna, that Warsaw had been captured was in communication with the city on Monday and the Reds had not yet taken it.

## Privileges Deprived Prominent Member

## Archbishop Mannix Gives Interview

LONDON, August 17.—Archbishop Daniel Mannix today denied that he intended to go to Ireland by way of France, as such a course would be inconsistent with the dignity of the church. Asked with regard to the report that he had been summoned to Rome, Mannix said, he planned to go to Rome about Christmas time, but he refused to say whether he had been summoned. "It is improper to discuss communication from the Vatican," he said. Regarding Premier Lloyd George's offer to bring Mannix to England to visit him as he is barred from Ireland, he said the proposal was preposterous as his mother was 90 years old and could not make such a journey.
