The old Rankin house, the building on the corner of Water and Pownall Streets, has been almost all removed from the site where for many years it stood, a prominent landmark in Charlottetown. Built when that section of the City was a flourishing business section, it was first occupied as a private residence, afterwards being transformed into a hotel. It was long known as the Rankin House, but latterly has been neglected and dilapidated, so that its removal is in every way desirable.

The shipping of fresh fish from this Province promises to start early this season and as good prices are being realized in the New York market there will no doubt be a larger number of fishermen than in past years. The pork market is remarkably quiet for this time of year. There is very little product offering, and the hogs that are being supplied fall far short of the buyers' requirements. It is likely that farmers have been too busy to get their hogs in condition, and the high price of feed will doubtless tempt many this fall to market their pork in an unfinished state. This is rather a pity on many grounds, for the best class of goods is what gives a place reputation, and there is not much encouragement for manufacturers to keep in the awl when factors have to be maintained week after week with almost nothing doing.

The regrettable news of the sudden death of John Driscoll, of Hillsboro, Lot 48, on Wednesday came with a shock to his neighbors and friends. Mr. Driscoll was a well known farmer, a prominent man in his community, and highly respected by all. He was in his fifty-fourth year, and up to the time of his death had enjoyed robust health, although it is supposed that he was a sufferer from heart disease. It appears that on Wednesday morning Mr. Driscoll had eaten his breakfast and was in his usual good health. Then he yoked his team and went to one of his fields and began to plough, or long after starting work he was seized with the attack, and was carried home. Medical assistance was sent for but Driscoll passed away before the doctor arrived. There survive him a widow, and a large family. Sincere and general sympathy is on all sides expressed for those bereaved so suddenly.

There departed this life, at Peters Road, Lot 68, on October 25th, 1907, after a lingering and painful illness, borne with Christian resignation, Walter Campbell, in the 57th year of his age. For a number of years Mr. Campbell was conscious that he was in conflict with an illness, which is seldom overcome, but he struggled bravely for the mastery and all that medical skill and kind attendance could devise was brought to his aid, but in vain, and the rest he so desired was gained in death. The large circle of friends with whom he mingled will miss the familiar figure, and the bereaved home will mourn for him, whom they see not now. The funeral services were conducted by his pastor Rev. Andrew Grey, who spoke hopefully of the greater life beyond. In the home he leaves the bereaved widow, and one son, Hugh, the only child. Two brothers survive him Neil and Duncan Campbell, of Sturgeon. The remains accompanied by a large number of friends and relatives were interred in the cemetery at Murray Harbor North. Also at the same home, about one month previous, there departed, this life Popsy White, adopted daughter of the deceased in the 23rd year of her age. Rev. Andrew Grey conducted the funeral services, and the remains were interred in the cemetery at Murray Harbor North.
