A. S. BURGESS, a prominent apple grower and shipper of the Annapolis Valley, arrived at the Royal yesterday, and reports that in his opinion, this year's crop in the valley will be little better than the crop of last year, which was one of the worst in many seasons. He says the season lies in the fact that cold and wet weather existed when the trees were blossoming. He anticipates hardly half a full cup, as far as his own orchards are concerned.—St. John Sun.

COMMANDER PEARY, whose new steamer, the Roosevelt, is nearly ready for her dash for the pole, says: "I have a perfect ship and twenty splendid Newfoundland men. We shall start in about a week. We go to Sydney, Cape Breton, to take on 500 tons of coal. Then we go through the Gulf of St. Lawrence, Bellisle Gulf of Labrador, to the West coast of Greenland, Melville Bay, and the Whale Sound region, where we make up our consignment of Esquimaux. Our base will be at Cape Sabine, where we take on twenty Esquimaux and their families, skilled hunters. We shall drive through Hobson and Kennedy channels and go into winter quarters about Sept. 1."

MATTHEW J. BUTLER, formerly head engineer on the Hillsboro Bridge and who succeeds Collingwood Schreiber as Deputy Minister of Railways, is a Canadian and was born at Deseronto, Ont., in 1856. He took his degree at the University of Toronto and was licensed land surveyor in 1878. He has led an active life and has for the greater part of it been connected with railroad work. He was assistant engineer on the Kingston and Pembroke railway, chief engineer on the 1,000 Islands railway, and on the Napanee, Tamworth and Quebec road, and assistant engineer in charge of the building of the Colorado division of the Atchafalaya, "Topeka and Santa Fe from 1889 to 1891. In that latter year he became superintendent and manager of the pulp mill on that division, but soon accepted the position of chief engineer of the Bay of Quinte railway and Navigation Co., which office he held for a number of years. Previous to his appointment to the staff of the Transcontinental railway he had been in charge of the construction of the new locomotive shops at Montreal. Mr Butler is a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers, an Associate of the Institute of Civil Engineers of England, and a member of the council of the Society of Canadian Engineers.
