—RELATIVE VALUES.—Fuel experts say that a cord of mature or full grown wood is equal in fuel value to a ton of coal.

—WOOD PRICES.—In the town of Souris a good single load of hardwood fetches two dollars from the householders. The majority of Souris residents own horses and haul their own wood, as plenty of good hardwood can be obtained within four or five miles of the town.

—WOOD PLENTIFUL AND CHEAP.—Wood fuel of the highest quality is so apparently plentiful east of Harmony, that the factories are getting old, mature wood (not second growth), cut and split, delivered at the factory, an average of four miles from the stump, for \$5 a cord.

—WOOD FOR MUSSEL MUD.—Not a few Eastern farmers are exchanging cars of wood for cars of mussel mud with the mud-diggers at Middelburg. One man obtained four cars of mud from St. Peter's people in this way "good for you and good for me", as the Arab pedlar says.

—MUSSEL MUD BEATS LIME.—A farmer at Harmony Junction tried lime and mussel mud on his wheat, year before last. One half of the field was limed; the other half mudded, usual quantities of each. The greater value of mud was shown in the wheat, but the better growth of clover from the mud, this last summer was prima facie evidence of the superiority of the mud. St. Peter's mud can't be beat.

Old Age Pensions Bill Gets Second Reading in Senate

OTTAWA, Mar. 25.—With the assistance of more than a score of Conservatives, the government carried the second reading of the old age pension bill in the Senate this afternoon by 61 to 14.

Party lines were broken on both sides, Sir Allan Aylesworth, Hon. J. G. Turfitt and J. F. Wilson who sit to the right of the speaker voted against the government and some twenty four or twenty five Conservatives voting with the government.

The bill was referred to the committee of the whole, the Senate rejected the amendment moved by Senator Belue, that it should be sent to the banking and commerce committee in order that the Prime Ministers of the various provinces might present their views and reports be examined with respect to the probable cost of establishing an old age pensions in Canada.

Under the government measures it is proposed to pay a pension of \$240 a year to persons attaining the age of 70, the dominion government to pay the cost of the provinces to share the cost equally.

Leopard As Witness In Court

BERLIN, Mar. 25.—A Berlin magistrate had to decide recently whether a man was entitled to keep a leopard in his apartment.

The owner of the leopard said it was as quiet as a lamb. His neighbors said it was a dangerous beast. Their dogs barked in terror when they heard its savage growls, and the occupants themselves went in fear of their lives.

"Wait a minute," said the owner to the magistrate, and he dashed out of court, returning later with the leopard in his arms.

"Did the wicked people say you were a savage beast?" he said to the animal as he took his place before the magistrate. He stroked it and bent down and kissed it several times.

While he was asking the magistrate to notice what a harmless creature it was the leopard nestled in its owners arms and was on its best behaviour. The magistrate seemed favorably impressed by its conduct, when it suddenly ruined its master's case by taking a flying leap from his arms to the judge's table, growling in a most savage way.

The magistrate and his clerk, assistants, witnesses, and police looked out of the door. When the leopard was caught and the proceedings resumed, the verdict was based on the animal's spontaneous evidence—to the delight of its enemies.
