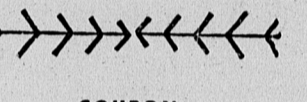

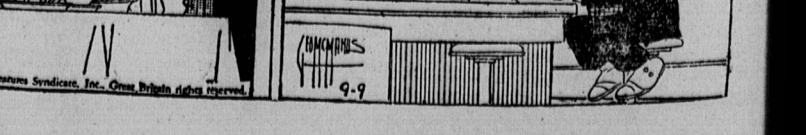
**VELVET GOWNS DISPLAY JEWELLED CLIPS**
