WOMEN WALK BEST ON ARTIFICIAL LIMBS

"If you could give every returned soldier a woman's sense of pride with his artificial leg, one of the biggest problems we have to-day would be solved," declared Mr. Harry Stevenson, a manufacturer of artificial limbs of years' experience who is now engaged by the Dominion Artificial Limb factory in Toronto, turning out artificial legs and arms for the returned soldiers in the Military Hospitals Commission Command.

"If there is any case in which practice makes master, and perseverance wins, it is in wearing an artificial limb, and women are more successful than men, simply because they are proud, and determined that no one is going to know that they wear one," he explained.

Nearly Six Hundred Limbs

"We have turned out 570 pieces of work here since we started, including arms and legs, and we have about 400 men under our charge now. Some of these men have been here a long time, and learn very slowly, others walk off the first day, and pass as whole men in a few weeks.

"You can get as much out of a properly fitted leg as you expect or try for. I have a leg which was willed to me when a man died, which he had worn for ten years laying cement sidewalks. It was all he had to leave, but at least it secured him a living while he was here.

Recommends Hook

"For the average man who wears an artificial arm I believe the hook gives a great deal more service than a hand. A hand is all right for show, but for a working man, if the arm is fitted correctly, he can do almost anything with a hook.

"The business of making artificial limbs is most interesting. Starting with a willow log with a hole bored through its centre, the limb maker evolves the flesh colored leg, jointed and flexing in the toes, which may deceive even a man's closest friends if he conquers it.

New Foot Shod Free

"The process requires many fittings and trials, and many times it is several months before all the necessary adjustments are made. There are several styles of legs as well as varying lengths, and every limb which goes out of the factory is fitted with a shoe and sock.

The fitting room is a long narrow place fitted up with bars about hand high, and between these supports the man takes his first uncertain steps and practices until he can walk alone.

Limbs Well Finished

The legs are adjusted by straps around the shoulders like the braces men wear, and the development of the industry since the days of the peg leg is most remarkable.

The joint is made much like that of the jointed doll's and the hinge in the toes of rubber. The toes themselves are all nicely modeled and the whole finish so fine in flesh color that one is certain no man would have the heart to take his sock up with a Dominion limb.

FILM TELLS FORTUNE OF DISABLED SOLDIERS.

M.H.C. Arranges Movie To Cheer Crippled Canadians in English Hospitals.

"Movies," showing the reception of a soldier when he returns to Canada have been hit upon as the best inoculation against "glooms" for the wounded Canadian in England, and the Military Hospitals Commission has arranged through the Army Y.M.C.A. to show a specially arranged film.

Just what happens to a returned man from the time he lands on the coast of the home country till he has been returned to civil life is delineated. He gets an idea of what the convalescent hospitals will be like, how he will be treated, what efforts are being made in vocational training to fit him for civilian life and what his chances are.

It will not be a piece of fancy word painting tending to raise false hopes, but a truthful portrayal of just what fine things are happening to the thousands of other Canadians who have come back disabled.

The film can be run off in an hour and speakers who have made a study of the situation will be present to urge men to take advantage of the great opportunities offered them to better themselves.
