**FORTHCOMING PATRIOTIC MEETINGS.**—The Patriotic Society at its meeting on Monday—Rev. Dr. Fullerton presiding—made provisional arrangements for patriotic meetings as follows: Monday, January 17, Fort Augustus and North River; Friday Jan. 21, Murray River, Murray Harbour, Iona, Wood Islands, Vernon River Chapel, and Eldon; Monday, Jan. 24, Victoria. A resolution was passed strongly urging the Minister of Militia to retain Charlottetown as the headquarters for 750 men of the 105th Battalion and for a battery of Artillery for which the necessary accommodation is available.

**FIELD KITCHENS SUPPLIED.**—Citizens who have seen the Students McClary Field Kitchen for the Highland Regiment may be interested to know that at least sixty such kitchens have been given the Canadian Forces as the result of private and public subscription donations. Some of the units thus equipped by the people of Canada are as follows: 18th, 19th, 20th, 25th, 26th, 28th, 31st, 33rd, 36th, 37th, 42nd, 45th, 46th, 54th, 58th, 59th, 60th, 69th, 77th, 80th and 84th Infantry Battalions; 5th, 6th (given by P. E. Island people to Col. Innes), and 8th Canadian Mounted Rifles; 5th Field Ambulance, Ammunition Column, Fredericton, N. B., and Ammunition Column, Toronto, Ont. Most of these units are now overseas but the 42nd and 69th Battalions, both from Upper Canada, are waiting at St. John, N. B. Two kitchens are sufficient for ordinary service and four for actual.

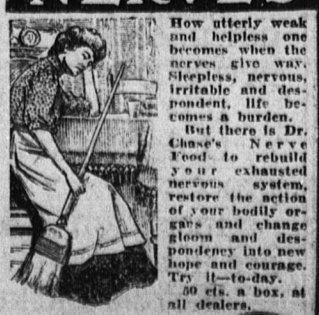
Dear Madam,—

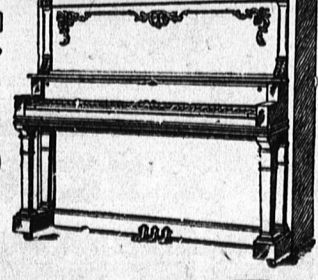
