Acadia University nosed out the Wolfville town aggregation by an orphan tally in a three-game series to decide the winner of the newly formed Valley League.

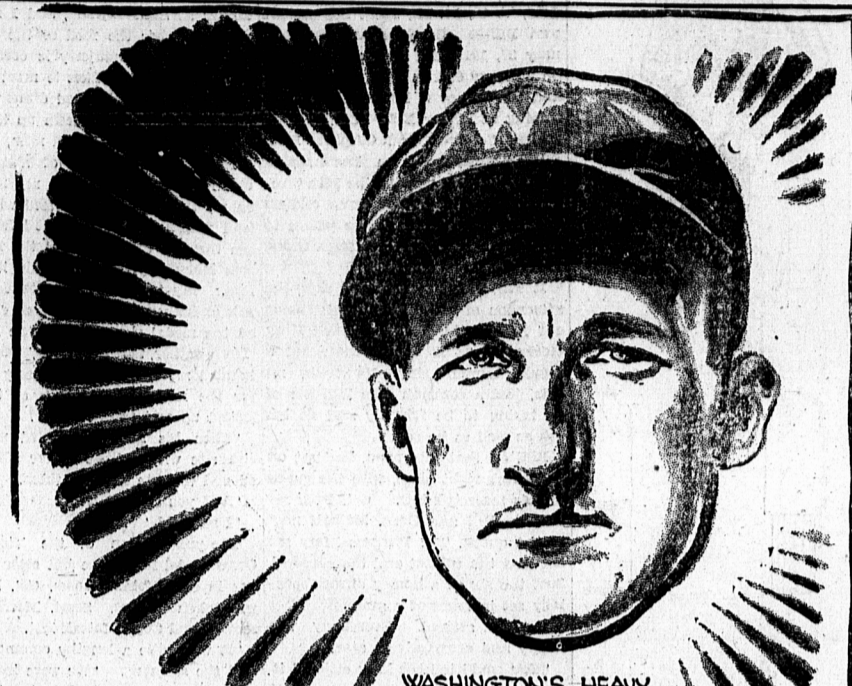
Harness Racing Prospects Bright for Coming Season
