THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press.)
Extreme dullness marked the export trade in Canadian grain here today. Cable advices were generally of a discouraging nature. Liverpool and London reporting demand for oats and barley, and cables received from Rotterdam stated that the grain market No. 1, No. 2, and No. 3 north wheat, but as there was no early shipment, the market on the whole was inactive. The domestic trade in coarse grains was also reported slow, the demand being chiefly for odd ears to meet immediate wants, but the tone of the market was not improved. Advanced half cent per bushel. There was some demand for foreign buyers for low grades of spring wheat flour and a little business resulted, but the trade in high grades for export account Halifax was quiet. No change in the English production at present.
