## TEACHERS' CONVENTION

### Opened in Assembly Hall P. W. College Yesterday—Election of Officers—Address by the President

The 29th Annual Convention of the P. E. I. Teachers' Association met in the Assembly hall of Prince of Wales College yesterday morning at 9.30 o'clock. Inspector C. W. Kiely, President of the chair.

The following committees were appointed: Finance, R. H. Campbell, Inspector Boulter, Miss Etta Hinch. Resolutions: J. D. Seaman, Clement Flood, Neil McCannell, Katy McPherson, Maud Hayes.

Program and entertainments: Jas. Landrigan, Garfield Bennett, Vernon Crockett, Bessie Boyer, Alice Finlayson.

In a forceful and suggestive address the President dealt with the benefits to be derived from conventions—the importance of midsummer holidays—teachers' salaries—the granting of permits to unlicensed persons to teach—text books—and the health conditions of the schools. This excellent address was commented on by J. D. Seaman, Mr. Conway, Inspector Boulter, Prin. R. H. Campbell.

The following committee R. H. Campbell, Inspector Kiely, Miss L.

K. Scott was appointed to ascertain the number of provisional permits that had been granted to persons to teach during the past four years, and the conditions under which they were granted and report to this Convention before its close.

A resolution asking the executive to get all information possible re-appointing of teachers in the other provinces and secure a pension law for the teachers of this province was passed. Also one asking the Government to appoint a representative of the Teachers' Association on the Commission on Education to be appointed by them.

Convention closed to meet this morning at 9 o'clock.

## HUNDRED AND TEN SEAMEN DROWNED

WRANGEL, Alaska, Sept. 23.—(Special)—One hundred and ten out of a total 137 persons aboard the cannery ship Star of Bengal were drowned last Sunday afternoon when the vessel was torn from her protecting tugs and dashed ashore at Helm Point at the south east end of Coronation Island.

The news was brought by the tug Hattie Gage, captain Farret, which carried the survivors, twenty-seven in all.

Before leaving Coronation Island they buried the bodies of fifteen on the beach.

The cable ship Burnside, which left for the scene of the wreck on Monday returned last evening with news that the Star of Bengal was a total loss, only the ends of the masts showing above water.

The ship was being towed to sea from Wrangel cannery by the tugs Hattie Gage and Kayak.

The tugs could not handle the ship and the Star of Bengal drifted into a narrow bight and the crew could see

land on both sides abreast.

They had eight fathoms, the tow line was cut and the tugs steamed out into open water, but could not see anything in the driving rain except one blue light burning on the ship.

The storm increased and the tugs steamed away to Shipley Bay, 25 miles away.

TORONTO, Sept. 23.—(Special)—Rev. John Pringle, who exposed the conditions in the Yukon was in Toronto yesterday.

He will leave shortly on a visit to Sydney, N. S., where he has been called to act as pastor.

## THE CHARLOTTETOWN HORSES SWEEP THE RACE COURSE CLEAN

### Yesterday Was a Charlottetownian Day at the Race Course. The Three Races Were Won by City Trotters. Three Year Old Trot and Pace, Won by George Crescues. 2.19 Trot, 2.22 Pace Won by Kalol. 2.27 Trot, 2.30 Pace Was Won by Queen Marie.

### THREE YEAR OLD RACE.

It was nearly two o'clock when the first race was called in yesterday's races. The weather was all that could be desired and the track was only in fair condition, being a little heavy and dusty. The attendance was one of the largest on record, both balconies of the Grand Stand being filled, while hundreds lined the fences.

The first race called was the Three Year Old Trot and Pace, Purse \$207.00. The horses got away on the third score, Commodore Epaulet, with the pole Lady Commodore, second position and George Crescues on the outside. On account of the lameness, the result of an accident sustained in a car, while travelling, Parkin was drawn. At the Commodore Epaulet was leading, with Lady Commodore and George Crescues at her wheel. Coming down the stretch, Cameron let George Crescues out and he easily captured first position just after passing the wire on the half. On the back stretch George Crescues easily gained several lengths lead and won the race in 2.33. From the pole it was a fearful struggle between Commodore Epaulet and Lady Commodore for second position. Lady Commodore showed her metal by winning by a nose length.

Time 37 1/2, 1.55 1/2, Mile 2.33.

Second heat. The colts got away on the second score, with Geo. Cres-

They finished in this manner with George Crescues nearly three chains in the lead, trotting the mile in the excellent time of 2.29 1/2 and winning the race amid showers of applause.

George Crescues and his owner were given three cheers from their admirers on the Grand Stand, for which Mr. Beales happily bowed his thanks.

## ECALITIES AT THE ARENA

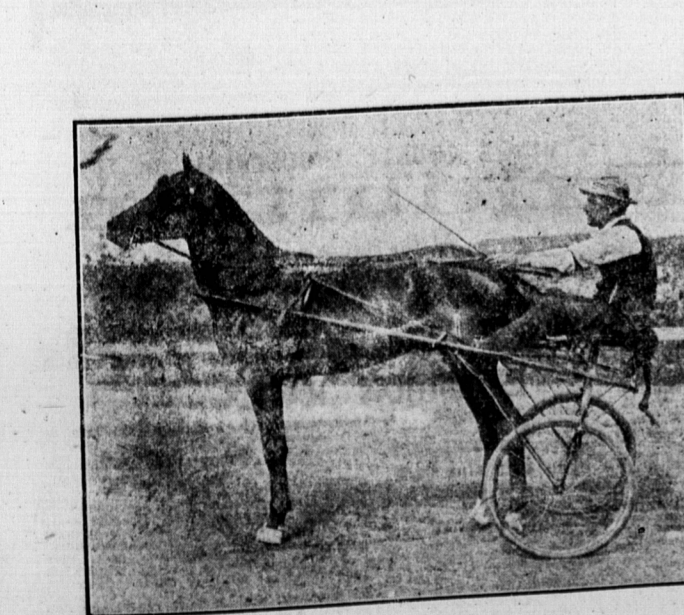
The special attractions at the Arena last night were largely attended and were without doubt the finest in their line that have ever come to this province.
