### BRITAIN GETS LARGE ORDER FROM SOVIETS

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Nov. 18.—Orders for various types of machine tools to the value of \$3,000,000 are to be placed in Great Britain by the Soviet delegation through its agent Arcos Ltd. An agreement to that effect was signed today by Saul G. Bron, Soviet trade representative here and Grenville Maginnes, chairman of the Associated British Tool Makers. The British Association will extend credit to the Russians to the full amount of orders placed and undertakes to construct technical assistance in connection with tool making works in Russia. Mr. Maginnes and directors of the Association will visit Russia next week.
