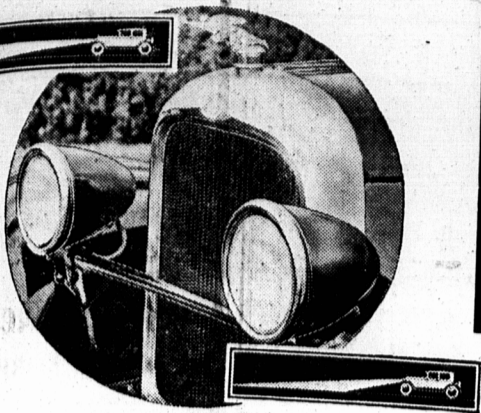

TWO-BEAM LIGHTS ON CUSTOM SEDANS

A night driving problem, as old as the automobile industry itself, has been solved by the lighting system employed in the line of custom designed motor cars recently introduced by Studebaker. And while this new system of illumination definitely and completely removes any "groping" along the highways while passing another car or in city driving where bright lights may not be used it is just as simple in operation as it is effective.

Instead of using one beam of light to show the road ahead and reducing the efficiency of that beam when passing another car on the highway or in cities, the custom designed Studebakers are equipped with a two-beam system. When touring at night the long range beam, which lights the road ahead for a considerable distance and throws a fan of light to the sides as well, is utilized. When another car comes within range of this powerful beam a mere touch of the control conveniently mounted on the steering wheel brings into play the reflected beam which is of full density brilliantly lighting the side of the road, yet so angled downward as not to confuse the drive of the approaching car.

In city driving this deflected shaft of light proves its superiority over the old-fashioned dimming practice as conspicuously as on the open road. Irregularities in pavement, bits of glass and the unlighted parked car are brought into bold relief by the strong rays which spread fanwise from curb to curb.

Admitted Padding List In 1925 Election

COLD LAKE, Alberta, Aug. 16—Admitting that as registrar for the split poll at Cold Lake, in the 1925 Federal election, he had liberally padded the voters' list Martin Nyhaus, Cold Lake fisherman and boatman, gave the first piece of positive evidence of irregularities Saturday, when questioned by Mr. Justice Clarke's commission which visited the witness in the hospital here where he is undergoing treatment for blood poisoning.

Nyhaus said he was appointed by Arthur Beatty, Hudson's Bay post manager at Loxoff. He admitted that there were more names on the voters' list than there should have been. He put on the list names of tourists who were visiting Cold Lake. Among them appeared the names of James Ramsay and W. Ramsay, of Edmonton, although they are described on the voters' list as fishermen living at Cold Lake.

C. N. R. Clerk Meets A Shocking Death

MONCTON, Aug. 16—Hugh Kelly, clerk in the general passenger department of the C.N.R. here, was the victim of a shocking tragedy on the C. N. R. main line about one and a half miles east of Moncton early Sunday morning. With his head and left foot completely severed from the body, the remains were found lying between the tracks by Henry Leger, track patrolman, who was proceeding east on patrol duty about 5:30 o'clock yesterday.

Deceased had evidently been killed just a short time before as his body was quite warm when Leger made the ghastly discovery at a point some 800 yards west of Humphrey's Station. While details are lacking as to exactly how the deceased met his tragic death the theory is that he had been accidentally run over by the C. N. R. eastbound fast freight.

The Herd Book, registration and scoring records, transfers of ownership, affidavits, are now being handled by a large staff of efficient employees to insure prompt service to all.

Foxes will be scored this fall by a larger staff of competent official judges. Routes are being laid out in advance for the judges, so that foxes in each section of the United States and Canada can be scored when in prime, and thus reflect accurately the true quality of the fur. Breeders are asked to send in their applications for scoring as early as possible in order that the schedule may be arranged to accommodate every one at the right time.

Foxes can be registered and transferred on the records of the Institute, without being scored, where Correct Pedigrees, backed by an affidavit of pure breeding, are available. A sample copy of the Certificate of Registration will be sent on request, to illustrate advantages of registration.
