Devaluation Aids Sales To Canada Of London Styles

LONDON, Feb. 16 — (CP) — British spring fashions won Canadian dollars when London's Big Ten style leaders unveiled their first 1950 fashion secrets.

It was the first full-scale fashion showing in London since last September's devaluation and attracted a larger number of Canadian and American buyers than at any time since pre-war days. Devaluation meant a saving of \$200 to \$300 on some models.

Hardy Amies' collection received an unexpected ovation from Canadian buyers and at least one third of his collection is bound for Canadian markets.

Expected to be a best-seller in Canada is "Hope", an exquisite strapless white organdie evening dress trimmed with Nottingham lace and having matching lace waistlength jacket.

Romance was given the emphasis in London's spring line. Dresses have big collars and sleeves of net or lace and are light and graceful in line and material. There are soft, clinging chiffons; youthful, spotted organdies; rustling, stiff silks and crisp, bright cottons.

Skirts are definitely shorter for coats, suits and day dresses—14 to 15 inches from the ground. And they are slim in line, either straight and light or with concealed pleating.

Jackets are longer, often blouse-back or boxed.

Waists Don't Pinch

Waistlines are natural—at least two inches bigger than the old nipped waist. Although the dropped waistline has not been generally adopted, waists can have a second lowered waistline indicated by buttons, large low-set pockets, or slanting belts.

This year's spring silhouette features the back view. Fashion is all behind with blouse backs, back pleating and back yoking. The front has a straight tube look.

Evening skirts are slim-ankled with bunty or hipline. Many day dresses are tiered and have dropped hemlines.

The new "triangle look" is emphasized by the bunty jackets slim skirt, slim straight jacket with huge triangular sleeve-ends, dresses with big yokes and double or triple collars.

The new sleeve width develops below the elbow, giving many varieties of melon, leg of mutton and mandarin-shaped sleeves. A huge batwing sleeve is part of the wide swing-back jacket and is held in almost cape fashion.

Neatly fitted waistcoat blouses are part of the box-jacket suits and slim, pencil skirts are combined with very short collared boleros exposing a midriff of intricately-pleated blouse.
