MONTREAL, Nov. 30—Cattle receipts 1419. There were no good quality cattle on sale today and the best steers weighed were up at from seven dollars to seven twenty-five and two good 1,100 pound steers were picked out of one load for seven fifty. Medium steers sold mostly from five fifty to six dollars and common steers from five twenty-five downwards. A number of medium quality heifers were sold around five dollars and mixed lots of fair heifers and eight steers at five dollars and five twenty-five. Good cows sold from four fifty to five dollars and common cows brought from three dollars to four dollars. Canners brought two dollars and cutters two fifty to two seventy-five.
