He complains very strongly with regard to the accommodations provided by the I. C. R. for the shipment of live stock to the Fair from Pictou to Amherst. He says that if a special freight train were put on the service between Pictou and Amherst, there would be a very much larger number of exhibitors from Prince Edward Island.—Amherst Exc.

The members of Prince Arthur, L. O. L., Crapaud, last Sunday morning attended Divine service in a body at the Baptist Church at Westmoreland when the pastor Rev. W. M. Field, delivered an eloquent and impressive sermon appropriate to the occasion. His text was "Other Men Labored and they are Entered into Their Labors," John 4:38. At the close of the service a collection amounting to over twelve dollars was taken in aid of the P. E. I. Orphanage.

R. S. Lea, C. E., formerly of this city and Consulting Engineer of the Water and Sewerage Department here and now resident in Montreal, is engaged professionally in connection with a large drainage project in Vancouver, where it is proposed to drain an area of 90 square miles into the harbor and English Bay. The work will occupy several years and is expected to cost some millions of dollars, the bonds being guaranteed by the British Columbia Government. The Vancouver Province gives the following sketch of Mr. Lea and the different engineering works upon which he has been engaged:—R. S. Lea is a graduate of McGill College of the class of 1890. For ten years he was in charge of the department of municipal engineering waterworks and sewerage at the university, then entering as assistant and later on as partner with Freeman Coffin, an eminent engineer of Boston, continuing in the latter capacity until the death of Mr. Coffin in 1907. Mr. Lea has assisted in the planning and installation of waterworks and sewerage systems for thirty cities in the New England states and eastern Canada. In Western Canada he was a member of the boards considering the development of the water system of Winnipeg and the sewerage system of Regina. He has been a member of and consulting engineer for the Provincial Board of Health of Quebec for the past twelve years, during which time he has reported on waterworks and sewerage systems in numerous cities of Europe. Other works with which Mr. Lea has been connected are the Chaudiere Falls hydraulic scheme at Ottawa, the development of power at the Long Sault Rapids on the St. Lawrence, and construction schemes carried out by the Laurentide Paper Company, Montreal Cotton Company, and the Montreal Light, Heat & Power Company. He is being paid \$100 per day during his initial visit here, the preliminary expenses being shared by the authorities interested, later to be charged up against the general scheme.

At the annual convention of the W. C. T. U. of St. John, which was largely attended, Mrs. Sprague, New Brunswick and P. E. Island president, was present and gave a very interesting address on the work being carried on by the union. She also gave an account of the business transacted at the dominion convention of the W. C. T. U., recently held at Sherbrooke at which delegates from all over Canada were in attendance. Mrs. T. H. Bullock, St. John, also treated the members to an interesting talk on the women's council meeting recently held in Toronto, at which she was in attendance. In telling of the progress made by this council she pointed out that an interesting feature of the convention was the laying of the corner stone of the new headquarters which is to be constructed at a cost of \$50,000. She described the ceremonial attending this in an interesting manner and said that the principal figure was Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Connaught, who laid the corner stone.

The S. S. Rosalind, Capt. Williams, arrived in port yesterday from Montreal and reports a very favorable trip down the river and across the Gulf. She left Montreal on the 27th of November and arrived here yesterday morning, this being a very good trip, not only for this time of year but for any time. Naturally the trip was a cold one, but sea and sky were clear and calm and the boat made the trip without an accident. In conversation with one of the officers this morning, a reporter was told that up to Montreal the ice is forming quickly and that already a thick coat covers the lake around the city. Shipping to and from the city is almost finished for this season, and in another week all will be quiet around the wharves of the Canadian metropolis. At several points from Montreal to Quebec the boat had to force her way through the hardening ice, but no damage was sustained. This is one of the latest trips the Rosalind has made for some years. Last year her last trip was made early in October. After unloading, the Rosalind will proceed to the Pier, and bunker, and thence will go to St. John's Newfoundland. She goes from there to New York, and during the winter months will ply in the "Red Cross" passenger service. At Montreal and away down the river for many miles, a thick mantle of snow covers the ground. In fact sleighing has been good for the past two weeks.—Sydney Exc., Dec. 5.
