Rifle Ass'n. Winter Series

The Dominion of Canada Rifle Association has notified all schools throughout the country of the conditions of their indoor winter com-

petition open to all cadet corps. Three matches are held on the home range, one to be fired in each month from January to March. The competition is divided into senior and junior sections, the former for boys of 16 to 18 and the latter for those of 12 to 15. Shooting is carried out under

strict supervision with the 22-inch rifle at 20 yards on the new 1933 standard target.

Among the numerous trophies offered are a silver shield emblematic of the championship; a twenty foot Union Jack awarded to the school whose junior team makes the highest aggregate score; Individual medals for seniors and juniors who attain a stipulated standard and special first and second class certificates to teams.

In addition, in Nova Scotia, there is the Colchester and Hants Regiment Shield to be awarded to the corps affiliated with that Regiment which makes the highest average score.

To date entries have been received at Ottawa from Queen Square School, Charlottetown, King's County Academy, Kentville, King's Collegiate School, Windsor, (senior and junior) and Glace Bay High School. The latter school took 7th place in the 1932 senior series against 91 other teams.

LONDON, Jan. 17.—Mr. Edward Denny Bacon, the well-known philatelist, was knighted and invested with the K. C. V. O. by the King at Buckingham Palace.

Sir Edward is the curator of the King's philatelic collections at Buckingham Palace, and is a past president of the Royal Philatelic Society, London.

He was responsible for the ar-

range of the Tapping collection of stamps, which was bequeathed by the late T. K. Tapping to the British Museum and his advice is often sought by the museum on stamp matters.

The King, who is patron of the Royal Philatelic Society, has been collecting stamps since he was a midshipman.
