Gruesome Warning To Chinese Bandits

MUKDEN, Manchuria, Mar. 19.—(A. P.)—The heads of nine Chinese executed as "bandits" by the Manchoukuo army were planted over Mukden today as a warning to any opponents of the new Manchurian regime.

The heads were placed on the ornamental arch marking the boundary between the international settlement and the Chinese section in accordance with an old Manchu custom, which was revived.

Urges Insistence On Canadian Right Of Radio Control

(By Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, Ont., March 19.—Maintenance of public ownership of the "Radio Element" in Canada was urged before the House of Commons Committee on radio yesterday by A. C. Campbell, spokesman for the Single Tax Association of Ontario. Mr. Campbell, who read a brief, said he could not give an estimate of the membership of his organization but said it had been in existence for fifty years.

The creed of the Single Tax Association was that all natural resources are a gift to the existing generations in trust for its own members and for future generations.

"This makes such resources, to our way of thinking, inalienable," the brief stated. "No private ownership can be established and any privilege granted to private parties must be balanced by a payment to the public of the value of that privilege. It is because we propose such payment as the sole source of general revenue for the public that we are called 'single taxers.'"

The brief urged that the Government take steps "to establish clearly Canada's sovereignty and ownership of the radio element as part of the Nations territory." It asked for the "Single Tax" method to be applied to the air by ensuring that the public would secure all the value of the privilege of using the air for broadcasting.

Commander C. P. Edwards, director of the radio branch of the Department of Marine, was recalled to answer questions. He described the origin of the international conferences on radio. The first was held in Berlin in 1906. They are held at five year intervals and the next will be held this year in Madrid.

The evil of "fading" was discussed by the witness. Broadcasting

stations sent out two waves, usually, one travelling on air channels and the other travelling along the ground. The ground wave carries the radio signal with gradually diminishing strength and gives a good reception to those within its limited range. Beyond that the listeners depend on the other wave which, in the day time, rises fairly straight up. At night this air wave is reflected downward by a heavy layer of air. The varying strength of this reflecting layer was one cause of the evil of "fading."

R. K. Smith, (Cons), Cumberland, asked Commander Edwards if an effort had been made to reach an agreement with United States in advance of the Madrid conference, on the matter of an increased share in the Radio Broadcasting band.

"The witness," said the informant, would have to be secured from the department of External Affairs. Col. A. W. Steel, technical adviser to the committee, said Canada would need from 12 to 15 high power channels to effectively carry out her broadcasting responsibilities. At present Canada had seven channels on the North American band, and shared some others. Col. Steel said these additional channels could be secured, "if we go after them."

The committee adjourned until March 31.
