The fish market was largely attended with prices ranging much, the same as last day.

THE GUARDIAN has received the annual prospectus and course of study of St. Dunstan's College for the coming scholastic year. St. Andrew's College was closed about 1845, after which Bishop McDonald purchased the beautiful grounds on which St. Dunstan's College now stands, and having thereon a building suitable to the requirements of his times opened it for the reception of students in January, 1855, under the rectorship of Rev. Angus McDonald, who directed the destinies of the new College with great ability and success down to 1869. Additions and improvements had been made to the buildings and grounds from time to time. The Faculty now includes ten Professors.
