Miss Rebecca Bryenton of Cleveland, Ohio, who has spent a very pleasant summer visiting relatives and friends in this Province, left Tuesday morning on return.

A particularly distressing fatality occurred Sunday afternoon, at the home of Mr. McKay, milkman, St. Peter's Road, when a little child, the only daughter of Thomas and Mrs. Graham, Murray Harbor North, was so severely scalded that death resulted.

The little one, who was only eleven months old, pulled a cup of hot liquid off the table the contents falling on her head.

A doctor was immediately summoned and everything possible was done for the little one but the nervous shock, as well as the injury, could not be overcome and the child passed away at one o'clock yesterday. The father of the deceased has
