SMALL BALLOON WINS CONTEST

BERLIN, Oct. 15.—Fourteen of the seventeen balloons which started from Tegel, near here, yesterday, in the race for Emperor William's cup, have been reported landed. Only the Helios Vienna Aero Club, Dr. Schiel aeronaut, the Schoke, Munich Air Navigation Club; Dr. Emden, and Franklin, Frankish Airship Club; Carl Hochstetter, not having been heard from. It appears to be certain at this moment that the Ernst, the smallest of the balloons, 690 cubic metres, Berlin Air Navigation Society, Dr. Brockmann, has won the contest, as it landed at Brieg, Austria, 300 miles away.

MONTREAL, Oct. 15.—The Star's London correspondent cables: The Salvation and Church Army emigration is raising something like a revolt against Canada among old established emigration agents who contend that these bodies, under the cloak of religion, are snatching up their emigrants for the sake of the booking commissions, and depriving them of the legitimate fruits of their labors, on Canada's behalf, for the last twenty years.

SLAVERY IN FLORIDA ALLEGED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—French allegations of the existence of slavery in southern Florida, below Tampa, have been made to the Department of Justice, and it is alleged that hundreds of men in the State, both white and negroes are held in virtual slavery. It is declared that those responsible are mostly Northern men and companies engaged in the turpentine and lumber business and in mining phosphate rock.

DREADNAUGHT TO BE RIVALLED

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Plans for the new 1800 ton battleship, which is to be the equal if not the superior of the Dreadnaught, are nearly completed. While it is admitted that it will hardly be possible this year to surpass the English ship in the quality of speed, protection, bunker capacity, and armament it is thought that the American ship will have many improvements in detail over her foreign sister in such matters as skeletonizing the military mast and the like.

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
