Fight Round By Round

ROUND ONE
Loughran danced lightly from his corner, slipped under Carnera's left jab and shot a long left to the body. Carnera pressed him to the ropes and as they swapped body punches Tommy complained Carnera was stepping on his feet. Carnera leaped on the challenger and tumbled him across the ring, leaving him from side to side, and the crowd boomed as Loughran bobbed like a cork in a stormy sea. Carnera drove Tommy to the ropes, gave a left hook to the head, a heavy right to the body and another left to the body. Tommy danced away instead and stabbed Carnera's head with three left jabs but the champion reared back at him flinging him about in his huge arms nailing him with a hard uppercut to the head as the bell sounded.

ROUND TWO
Loughran surprised the big boy dancing a left to the head and chopping a right to the body. Carnera stabbed Tommy's face neatly with a long left and Tommy, looking like a pigmy beside the tremendous bulk of the champion, bobbed his right back on the nose. Carnera jumped into close quarters and roughed Loughran along the ropes but Tommy tied him up neatly as Carnera swung wildly with both hands. Carnera chased Tommy into a corner, whipped a left to the body and a right to the head which shook the challenger body. Holding Tommy with one hand Carnera drove the challenger across the ring and hurled him about roughly, falling to land the blow but bearing down with all his weight on Loughran's smaller form and the crowd howled in protest as the referee pulled the champion away angrily at the bell.

ROUND THREE
Loughran took the offensive jabbing Carnera's nose three times with a light left. As Carnera seized the tiny challenger, started to hurl him about again the crowd howled again. The champ grinned and let Tommy loose. Loughran danced away lightly, pumping three lefts to the head and a right to the body. Carnera charged after him smothered him in his big arms and hurled him about on the ropes clubbing left to the body, rights to the side of the head. As they tangled in the open Carnera hit the challenger with a hard left hook to the head but Tommy stopped short and belted the champ with a long straight right to the jaw. The crowd roared approval. Carnera fought back savagely pounding on Tommy's arms and with both his huge fists. Tommy pulled out of a dangerous spot in a corner to fling a left hook to the head and a right to the body as the round ended.

ROUND FOUR
Dancing in swiftly Tommy shot a left to the head and a right to the body. That angered the champion so he picked Tommy up and almost hurled him through the ropes on one side of the ring. The referee warned him again and Loughran danced swiftly in jumping Carnera's face with a short left, crossing his right full and hard to the jaw. Carnera missed a wild right in a return and Tommy trapped the champion with lefts again, hammered his right to the side, and flung another right to the head as Carnera started to flounder. Matching all his guile against the tremendous strength of the champion Tommy stabbed in with lefts, fished him out of position and banged him with both hands as the crowd went wild with applause. Tommy was making the champion miss and Carnera looked like a novice as Loughran separated him and out danced him to the end of the round.

ROUND FIVE
Carnera caught Tommy coming in with a left to the side of the face and roughed Tommy unmercifully along the ropes, holding him with his first hand while the other stifling him on the side of the head. He drove Tommy into a corner and the challenger made the giant miss with both hands. But Carnera heaved heavily on the little fellow as Carnera smashed him about the head with both hands. Carnera chased Tommy across the ring, caught him on the other ropes and did it all over again. Tommy bounced from side to side totally unable to cope with the champ's strength. As Carnera batted him again in a corner Tommy suddenly stepped out with a left to the jaw and Carnera's knees. Again Tommy sent a right to the chin and Carnera seemed to stagger a trifle. Furiously Loughran smashed both hands to the body with a beautiful rally as the bell sounded.

ROUND SIX
Carnera rushed out anxiously and Tommy speared him with a left to the face that brought a lump under the champion's left eye. Loughran flew at the champ with both hands smashing rights and lefts to the giant's face and Carnera was so frantic he grabbed Loughran about the face with one hand and hammered his head with a right until the referee forced

him to stop. Falling at long range, Carnera grabbed Tommy again and forced him to the ropes where he hammered wildly at Tommy's body, forcing him half way out of the ring. Tommy came away and snarled another hang right to the jaw but Carnera forced him to the ropes and hit him on the head with both hands. Loughran crashed a right to the heart and the crowd boomed as Carnera was lifted a left as the referee broke them. Loughran banged a right to the body but blood trickled down his face from a cut on the left side of his head as the bell sounded.

ROUND SEVEN
Moving swiftly Tommy danced about the great bulk of the champion trying to reach him with a left jab to the face but Carnera stabbed out three times with his left to Tommy's jaw. Loughran shot a light left to the body and as the champion rushed in, tied up Carnera neatly. As they came away Loughran shot a terrific right to Carnera's jaw and the champion turned savage. He drove Loughran to the ropes, smashing his head with both hands, beating him as he would with two clubs and the challenger backed desperately, bobbed low and dodged as much of the storm as he could. Carnera calmed down and Loughran danced dizzily to the center of the ring again. He managed to jab a left to Carnera's head and a left to the side as the bell sounded.

ROUND EIGHT
Carnera tore out as if to end the fight swiftly catching Loughran in mid ring, driving Loughran across to the ropes under a best like attack from both fists. Tommy staggered as he came off the ropes and his legs were dragging wearily. He shot his left to Primo's body and then landed a hard right to the chin as Carnera followed. Again as Tommy retreated and the champion tore after him Loughran stabbed his left straight to the head and pounded his right on Carnera's jaw. Carnera became wild again and they danced each watching for an opening. Suddenly Carnera charged Loughran to the ropes but Tommy grabbed him, pulled his way out of danger and stabbed the champion's nose weakly as the bell rang.

ROUND NINE
Content to box with his lighter, challenger Carnera stepped back and Loughran's head with his left. Then Tommy slipped inside and shot his own left to the champion's jaw. Carnera rushed Loughran to the ropes again, where he continually held the upper hand, and bludgeoned Tommy about the head with his hands. Loughran came out heavily and Carnera jabbed him about the head and heaver him with three low left hands. Again Carnera jabbed Loughran's face with a left then crossed a right to the jaw as Tommy was moving away. As he made his effort to get away, as they clinched the referee pulled them away and Loughran drove a hard right to the head. They were dancing, both tired at the bell.

ROUND TEN
Loughran bounced up freshly and stabbed for Carnera's long jaw with his left. They popped jab at each other until Carnera again enveloped the challenger in his huge arms on the ropes and held him. Carnera again lunged for him around generally. Loughran tried to reach the champion's head with his left but he could only retreat to the opposite ropes when the champ again lunged for him. Once more Referee Shea hauled the champion off the little man angrily and Carnera shouted back at him in Italian. The pace slowed as they were content to feint for right hand openings. Tommy shot a long right to the head. Loughran whipped a left hook to the body and Carnera missed with both hands. Rallying beautifully Tommy slugged with the champion and landed half-dozen right hand smashes to the side as Carnera missed as many punches with both hands. Both went wearily to their corner at the bell.

ROUND ELEVEN
Loughran adopted new tactics. A low stabbing half-dozen lefts in the corner and smashed the champ heavily on the head with three right hand punches. Tommy staggered as the referee pulled them apart and he wearily lifted a left jab to the champion's head. Carnera measured him with a left but landed high on the head and the champion followed in with a hard hook to the jaw. Tommy danced heavily away and Carnera caught him in another corner pounding him on the head with a clubbing right. The champion sank a deep left hook into Tommy's body and forced him into a corner and banged to the head with both hands Tommy managed to dance away but he was weak and very tired as the bell sounded.

ROUND TWELVE
Loughran danced about the center of the ring, striving to keep away from Carnera's rushes. The champion bulled after him dogged-

The crowd boomed again as the champ took every advantage of his great size and hammered Tommy roughly in a corner, slung like hammers, belted down on Tommy's head and shoulders and he could scarcely drag himself erect from the corner. He leaned wearily on the champ, took another hard left hook to the head and then manfully heaved his right into Carnera's side. Tommy was dancing unsteadily at the bell.

ROUND FOURTEEN
Carnera galloped clumsily across the ring and heaved a left at Tommy's head but missed four feet as the crowd laughed. They danced in mid ring swapping left jabs, but when Loughran buried a deep hook to the body the champion caught him with both hands. Loughran staggered backwards and Carnera followed him madly, shooting for a knockout. Three heavy left jabs and a stumping right rocked the challenger. Desperately Tommy retreated, the left side of his face swelling, and Carnera chased him to the ropes. A left and right to the head, a left to the body. Tommy crossed legged into a corner. Weakly the challenger swung two left hooks to the head but Carnera laughed he drove his right into the ropes and belted Tommy's head with rights. Loughran was so dazed he went to Carnera's corner at the bell and in friendliness Carnera's seconds tried water on him.

ROUND FIFTEEN
Loughran rattled desperately jabbing lefts to Carnera's body and a right to the head. Carnera charged him to the ropes and dropped a hard right on Tommy's chin. Jackie Schurman, star of the Western team, notched his team's lone counter a minute after McCarron's tally, his rolling shot from well out trickling past the hawkeyed "Tid" McEwen in the Primroses cage.
It was a bitter struggle all the way through, with both goalies being outstanding as the forwards attacked in for close-up drives. The winners outplayed the outplayed the Club boys for two periods, and then fell back on the defensive to thwart the herculean efforts of the Summerside six. Montague deserved their win, but in fairness to the Summerside team it may be stated that it was their third game in four nights, a tough schedule and besides had only eight players in uniform.

"Tid" McEwen again was outstanding in the final period as he made spectacular saves from the desperate Summerside crew. Waterworth, McCarron, Beer and Grant also turned in sparkling exhibitions all through the game.
Hert Schurman, goalie of the losers shared the spotlight with McEwen, being particularly effective in the first two cantos while Jackie Schurman and Montgomery former crystal stars on the firing line of the Westerners were constant threats to the opposing team's peace of mind.
