JAMES R. ADAMS, whom many in Charlottetown will remember as the clown in Humpty Dumpty, was one of the attractions at the New York Hippodrome last week. He took the place of Marceline the famous French clown, did his stilt act and made a tremendous hit.

ROBERT B. MANTLE opened his New York season in Richard III, at the Garden Theatre Monday week. A great impression was made by the star and his excellent company, among whom is Marie Booth Russel, who was his leading lady when he played in Charlottetown.

The auction sale of the household furniture of Mrs. John Williams, Craupaud, took place on Friday the 27th. Good prices were realized. O. B. Wadman, auctioneer took charge of the sale and was assisted by E. L. Mabey. Mrs. Williams and family left yesterday morning for Port Blakeley, Wash. where they will reside in future.

HUNTER and Crossley have been holding great meetings at Walkerton Ont. On Sunday night there were nearly 2,000 people present and at the Sunday afternoon meeting there were 1,000 men. In Walkerton and Hanover, the business places were all closed during afternoon services on a week day. One minister was ordained recently at Tiverton, Ont. who was converted at one of the meetings held in British Columbia, and there is an English Church clergyman in the Northwest, who was converted in New Westminster, B. C. The evangelists were to begin in Owen Sound last Sunday, and this is their second visit. They go to Brandon, Man., on a third visit where they commence meetings on Nov. 10th. The two ministers referred to above were only found out by the evangelists fourteen years after their conversion. We hope they will be able to visit St. John, N. B., this winter—Wesleyan.

In view of the Bible Society's great Thanksgiving on Nov. 7 for the completion of its Centenary Fund of a quarter of a million guineas, the following details as to the chief sources from which the money came, throw a curious sidelight on the attitude of various countries towards the society and its work. Thus for instance £12,000 was sent by British North America; £6,000 came from Continental Europe; £4,000 from India; £5,500 from South Africa; £3,500 from New Zealand; £3,000 from Australia; £740 from Egypt; £730 from Russia; £30 from Japan; and £1,100 from China. The great bulk of the fund, as much as £220,000 came from England and Wales. Among the more striking contributions to the fund have been one gift of £10,000, one anonymous gift of £3,000, one gift of 2,500 guineas, one of £2,500, five of 2,000 guineas (one of which was anonymous), one anonymous gift of £2,000, thirteen gifts of 1,000 guineas (two anonymous), and ten of £1,000, (four anonymous). By far the greater part of the fund, however, has been raised by comparatively small gifts, often from poor people. The smallest separate contribution acknowledged at the Bible House was 1/4d. from a domestic servant.

FRANCE Edward Island, that now has almost a continental reputation for the sobriety of its people and the effectiveness of its Prohibitory Law, has long been noted for the earnest workers that it has had in the temperance cause. The Colonial Herald published in this city an issue of May 23rd, 1840 records the following report of a general meeting of the Charlottetown Temperance Society that even in these early days was strong in members and in influence.—It was resolved that a Committee be appointed to provide a fund and make the necessary arrangements for offering a prize for the best essay upon the subject of the Traffic of Ardent Spirits as bearing upon the civil, political, domestic, moral, and physical interests of this colony—such essay to be the production of a member of a temperance society. In conformity with the above resolution the Committee begged leave "to acquaint the friends of temperance that subscription lists for the purpose of raising funds for the object mentioned are now lying for signature at the stores of Mr. Peake, Mr. C. Welsh, and Mr. T. Desbriary, Queen St. at Mr. John Boyer's, Richmond St. at Mr. George Beer's, King Square, and at the Colonial Herald Printing Office."

McDonald Superintendent of the Hillsboro Bridge construction work, asserts to The Guardian that those in charge of the swing were free from any blame in the collision between the schooners Palmda and Winged Arrow which took place Monday afternoon. 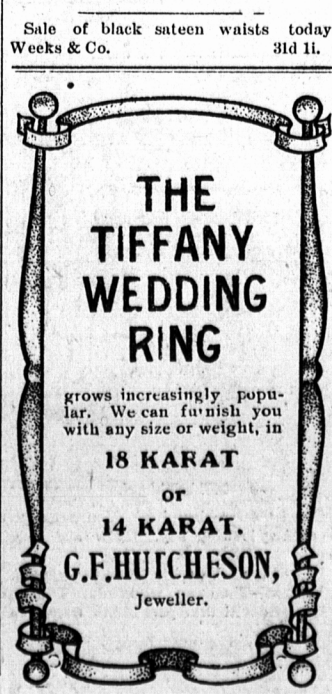
