### WESTERN WINTER ROUTE.

The Summerside Board of Trade, as has been its custom for many years, has taken precautions to ensure the timely arrival, the regular outgoing and incoming and, finally, the as-late-as-possible departure of the winter steamer, together with the usual accompaniments of favorable freight rates, publicity, etc.

The precautions this year, are, possibly, more binding than usual. President McArthur, in his letter to the Minister, having placed his hurdles categorically, each being numbered so that there could be no evasion or dodging. And the Minister in reply took each hurdle gamely and categorically, as numbered. The Minto will be at Summerside ready to take up the service as soon as the summer steamers finish; the different railways will be notified as to the sailing schedule; he shied a little at the third hurdle, stating that this question (through freight rates) would be referred to the Department of Railways and Canals; at the fourth he broke visibly but went over it, (the demand was that the "sailings and duration of service be left to the discretion of the Captain, Dr. Murphy and the Board of Trade." It was interpreted by the Minister to mean that these should "be arranged in the best interests of the public and that the service will be maintained as late as possible.") He, the Minister, went over the last hurdle like a bird. "Due notice will be given to the public before the Minto is withdrawn from the route."

These matters are not referred to here because they are new or contain any assurance that had not been given in former years. Similar demands and similar promises are on record in the newspaper files in Summerside and in the archives of the Summerside Board of Trade. They are repeated in the hope that the coming winter will see a better attempt at fulfillment than the previous records show.

persistence with which it insists upon a reasonable winter service between that port and Cape Tormentine. A fatal and a seriously unjust mistake was made when the third winter steamer was withdrawn from the Island service, a mistake which will, until rectified by the restoration of the third steamer, have a crippling effect upon the winter service.

With a third steamer the service on the western route could be greatly prolonged in the early winter and opened in the early spring long before the usual opening of navigation. The car ferry, however, is now looked forward to as an improvement on all three steamers and the restoration of the third steamer in the meantime is not open to discussion. If the Department of Marine carries out its promises, there will be little that can be profitably complained of and we shall look forward to as literal a fulfillment as possible.

It is somewhat amusing, and regrettable as well, to note the different views taken by the two rival political newspapers on this vexed annual question. One credits the Board of Trade with having written to and received from Hon. J. D. Hazen the letter and reply thereto, summarized above, intimating, casually, that a copy of the former had been sent to Dr. Murphy asking him to use his influence to strengthen the claims set forth. It publishes the letters, signed respectively by C. McArthur, President, and J. D. Hazen, Minister of Marine. The other paper publishes Mr. Hazen's letter to Dr. Murphy, making the promises mentioned, as an "evidence of the spirit which animates the present government in its treatment of our winter service as contrasted with the manner in which we were served in the past." It mentions, casually, that the Board of Trade had also written to Mr. Hazen. It is safe to anticipate that whatever the service may turn out to be it will meet with the unqualified approval of the latter party.

Our Boards of Trade, to be of real service to the province, and there is infinite room for them, must eliminate politics entirely, and we believe they do, and our papers, in reporting Board of Trade proceedings should remember that the object of the Board is not to boost or condemn any political party but to use its influence, non-politically, for the benefit of the community and the province.

### NOTES

A great many speakers before country clubs and Empire clubs throughout Canada, says Canadian Colliers, have the pleasant habit of reassuring their hearers that whatever part of the country they come from will always "do its duty to King and Empire." This phrase brings cheers. Repeated often enough, it will make even a very dull speech quite inspiring, and everyone will vote the speaker a regular Cicero. As a matter of fact, it is time we took it for granted that all the parts of Canada are anxious to do their duty to King and Empire. It should be clearly understood among English-speaking Canadians that even the much-misunderstood French Canadian Nationalist claims to be loyal. The whole country is loyal; the problem is to decide upon rightness or wrongness of the details of the various proposals by which various persons seek to demonstrate their willingness to do their duty to the throne. We continually make demonstrations before the gates of the problem, but we are slow to walk in and face the prosaic difficulties behind the walls.
