**Notice Re-obstructing
Drains on Public
Highways**

The attention of the public is called to Section 65 of the Road Act which reads as follows:—

"No person shall obstruct or impede the water course of any drain draining any highway in order to facilitate his access from his property to such highway, and it shall be the duty of every owner or occupier of land fronting on the highway to see that such drains are kept open at the point of approach through any gateway, lane, or other way from the property owned or occupied by him to such highway, and any offence against this provision shall be punishable by fine not exceeding ten dollars."

All Inspectors and Overseers are hereby required to see that the Act in this respect is strictly complied with.
