**MR. HUGHES** asked the Leader of the Government to lay on the table of the House a copy of The Minute of Council respecting the claim of Angus M. Darrach of New Haven for damages sustained while working on West River Bridge in 1913.

(2) What was the amount claimed by Angus M Darrach in January 1918.

(3) What has the Government done or intend doing with this claim.

Reply 1 Copy of Minute of Executive Council "The claim of Angus Darrach, New Haven, for compensation for leg broken while employed repairing bridge at West River in the summer of 1913 was referred to a Com. consisting of the Premier, Commissioner of Public Works and Commissioner of Agriculture to report on.

—2 \$1,580.

3 No definite conclusion reached.

**MR. SAUNDERS** asked the Honourable the Commissioner of Agriculture to lay on the table the answer to the following questions in writing, namely:

(1) How was the Federal Grant for Agricultural purposes expended in detail for the financial year ending March 31st, 1919?

(2) Have these accounts been audited by the Provincial Auditor? Under whose direction was the expenditure made? Was there any Dominion Official engaged in the expenditure on the Dominion Grant. If so, who was the Dominion Official.

Reply. The answer is being prepared.

**A. E. McLEAN** asked the Leader of the Government to lay on the Table of the House answers in writing to the following questions.

(1) Has an agreement been signed by any one in this Province under the Provisions of the arrangement arrives at by the International Convention held by Canada and the United States in regard to the Shooting Privileges in this Province and throughout the Dominion.

(2) If so lay on the table of this House copy of such agreement.

(3) State who signed agreement and their authority for so doing.

Reply. The Premier was not aware of any such agreement. No agreement has been signed by this government.

**MR. PATON** asked the Commissioner of Public Works the following question:

Did the Commissioner of Public Works receive a petition from Charles A. Gillis, Orwell Cove signed by the residents of Orwell Cove and China Point for a foot passenger and vehicle traffic bridge across the China Point and Orwell Cove Ferry? If so, what action does the Government intend taking in the matter?

Reply. Petition received. The matter will be carefully looked into during recess.

**A. E. McLEAN** asked the Commissioner of Agriculture to table answers to the following questions in writing:

(1) What receipts were received from drainage, to offset Expenditure of \$3895.88 on page 341 of Agriculture Report 1918.

(2) Give itemized statement of this expenditure, also cost per acre of land drained.

Reply. The answer is being prepared.

**Strike in Ireland All Work Suspended**

**LONDON, May 1.**—All Irish workers except those in the northern parts of the Islands have entirely ceased work today. The railroads, newspapers, factories, shops, and other industries are closed down in compliance with the order from the powerful transport workers union. Although the one day strike will not be observed in the north there will be labor demonstrations and processions in the cities there. Civil servants in Dublin have been officially notified that any absenting themselves from work today will liable to instant dismissal.

**Belgium's Demands**

**BRUSSELS, May 1.**—Extremely strong measures relative to Belgium's demands at the peace conference have been decided upon by the Belgian Government. According to the "Soir" Belgium will not accept the terms the Council of Three desires to impose upon her. The newspaper says: "She will demand a complete fulfillment of the promise contained in the declaration to her by France, Great Britain, Italy and Japan as expressed in the seventh of President Wilson's fourteen points. She will refuse to sign any peace treaty which does not restore Belgium to political and economic independence and do not entirely indemnify her for damage sustained during the war."
