Dredge No. 9 has been shifted from Murray Harbor to Hurd's Point, Bedeque, where it will be engaged in the work of improving the channel for the ferry boat and other craft. Splendid work has also been done at Murray Harbor where at Beach Point a boat harbor for the fishermen has been made. All that is needed there now is a short wharf where matter no doubt will receive the attention it deserves in due course.
