A GOOD audience assembled last evening in the school room of Zion Church to hear a lecture delivered by Rev. J. C. Martin, who recently returned from Turkey, where he has laboured for ten years. In the part of Turkey where Mr. Martin has been stationed the majority of the people are Moslems or Mohammedans. Between these people and the Christians there is very little difference in their mode of life. They observe very closely many outward forms of religion which do not in any degree affect the character. Women are not respected, in fact are treated little better than slaves. They are not counted at all in taking the census, and have no social position.

TO THE CITIZEN ELECTORS OF CHARLOTTETOWN.

GENTLEMEN.—I have refrained from entering into any newspaper controversy in regard to the matter of City ownership of an Electric Light Plant expecting as the time drew near that the City Council would surely have some information to present to the intelligent electors whereby they might cast a fair honest vote in the matter with all data before them, and not be taking any plunge in the dark. That information the Council seems inclined to withhold, for what reasons, I leave the electors to judge for themselves, and all the information they see fit to give the citizens is contained in Mr. Wheat's letter in Saturday's Patriot and which information he gained in Halifax when he proceeded to that city last June in Company with Mr. Wadell. The citizens know full well without any words from me how unfairly the Council treated the Full Electric Co., after advertising for contracts and Mr. Wheat must take all the blame in the matter as he was the prime mover and manipulated the strings by which the majority of the Council danced. You will please bear in mind that at a meeting of City Council on Aug. 20th of last year it was after an uninteresting preamble moved by Councillor Taylor seconded by Councillor Brown and resolved "That a special committee be appointed to obtain full and complete data as to the cost of installing and operating an Electric Plant by this City and also for what the existing plants can be purchased, and that the matter be submitted to a vote of the electors in February next and if approved, of the work be immediately commenced. Bear in mind the significance of these words "immediately commenced." Mr. Wheat, in the report of that special committee. Where is the "full and complete data as to the cost" for the electors to give an intelligent vote? Nowhere that I have been able to ascertain, save in Mr. Wheat's letter, and that data was acquired in Halifax in June last and was submitted to the Council before the above resolution was carried. And in regard to the second clause I can state distinctly that no member of the Council asked the Full Electric Co. for what they will sell their plant. The Council is simply hood-winking the electors and acting all through in such a manner as no honest citizen could countenance. With these facts before you, citizen electors, do you intend to authorize the present Council to spend \$22,000 of your money in an Electric Plant? Pause well before voting for city ownership under these conditions. I stamp Mr. Wheat's estimates in regard to yearly expenses as absolutely wrong and perhaps my experience for fourteen months as President of the Full Electric Co. will entitle my estimates to carry as much weight with you as those obtained in Halifax by Mr. Wheat from a party who wanted to sell the City a plant. I have had experience in electrical estimates in Halifax and I find them unreliable from actual experience. I present the following estimates for your consideration for the yearly operation of 100 lights owned and operated by the City, and can assure you they are approximately correct. You may ask how the Full Electric Co. could afford to tender for the City lighting last year at \$50 per lamp. I will explain, coal was \$1.00 per ton less than at present and we could save the wages of a Superintendent and his assistant \$105.00; also a fireman \$400 and taxes, insurance, etc., having all these employees on hand would do all the work without extra expense to the company.
