MONTREAL, Aug. 4 (CP)—There were 81 cattle, 344 sheep and lambs, 496 hogs and 1132 calves for sale on the two Montreal livestock mar- kets today.

Cattle and hogs were strong and other kinds of live stock were steady. The cattle offered were mostly cows and bulls. Butcher cows were \$2.25 to \$3.25.

Calves were about 25 cents higher in spots. Veals ranged from \$10 to \$13.50, top \$14. Drinkers and light grassers made the bulk of the offerings and were sold from \$8 to \$9.50, mostly \$8.50 to \$9.25. Year- lings \$6 to \$7.

Good ewes and wethers were \$12, buck lambs \$11 and culls \$10. Sheep were \$5 to \$7.

Hogs were strong at \$16.25 to \$16.35 for B1 dressed. Grade A drew \$1 per hog premium with discounts on off grades. Sows were \$10.50 to \$11 live weight.
