Pythian Sisters In Session At Saint John, N. B.

HARTFORD Conn., Aug 19—Travel by airplane is gradually becoming safer in America, although it is still 22 times as hazardous as railroad travel, according to a report on aviation statistics issued here today by the Actuarial Society of America.

The report stressed the point that flying accidents reach a minimum when pilots have had 400 or more hours in the air. Pilots having less experience than this are more likely to figure in accidents, it is stated.

The passenger death rate on railroads, the report said, is approximately one per 300,000,000 passenger miles. The fatality rate in airway travel is one in 1,250,000 passenger miles.

One out of every 5,000 passengers carried in airplanes in the United States is killed, according to the report. This figure is based on a survey of scheduled airlines since January, 1927, through March of this year.
