ISLAND DOCTOR DIES IN BOSTON.—Dr. David McIntyre, for over 30 years a practitioner in the South Boston and Dorchester districts and noted for his work in obstetrics and lung cases, died yesterday at his home, 246 Boston street, Dorchester, at the age of 60 years. He was a native of P. E. Island and had been in falling health for the past few years, but continued his practice until two weeks ago, when he became confined to his bed. He was a prominent member of the Boston Medical Society and several social and benevolent organizations and was a doctor of the "old school." Charity was a watchword with him and he was loved and respected for his ready aid both by monetary assistance and voluntary services rendered as a physician for the poor of his section, whose call he never refused.—Boston Post.

FREDERICK CARTER.

The many friends of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Carter of Tignish will sincerely regret to learn that their son Frederick passed away on Friday last. He had been in failing health for some months previous but the end came unexpectedly. On Wednesday evening Aug. 29th he was taken severely ill and died within forty-eight hours. Fred was 25 years of age, a charming young man of sterling qualities and a true member of the Temperance Association. He was one of the volunteers for the "Happy Eight", but owing to poor health at the time was not accepted. URGING U.S. TO WAR ON AUSTRIA

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 7.—To offset the menacing possibilities in the Russian situation and to force Germany into peace more rapidly, the Allies will soon undertake a new anti-Austrian campaign. Strong pressure is being exerted on this Government to declare war against Austria, then to aid in downing her so that Germany would be without her aid and cut off from Turkey and Bulgaria. Thus far, American officials, including Secretary Lansing, have seen the rather imminent possibility of war between Austria and the United States though they have inclined to let Austria take the initiative. Just what form the new anti-Austrian activities may take is shielded as a military secret, though apparently it will come by way of Italy or through more forceful tactics in the Near East.

GENERAL HODGINS WILL GO TO LONDON.

Sept. 5.—Major-General W. E. Hodgins, acting adjutant-general, headquarters' staff, Ottawa, is vacating his post to accept an appointment on the overseas demobilization committee as representative of the militia department. He has been selected for this important post on account of his long connection with the militia as acting adjutant-general during the present war dealing with all problems relating to organizations, personnel, discipline, etc. General Hodgins has had thirty-five years' experience in the Canadian militia, and has had the following staff service:—Officer commanding, Ottawa brigade, 1902; district officer four 1903; district officer commanding military district number one, 1909; officer commanding first division area, 1911; acting adjutant-general, headquarters' staff, 1915. Major-General S. C. Mewburn will succeed Major-General Hodgins as acting adjutant-general at headquarters.

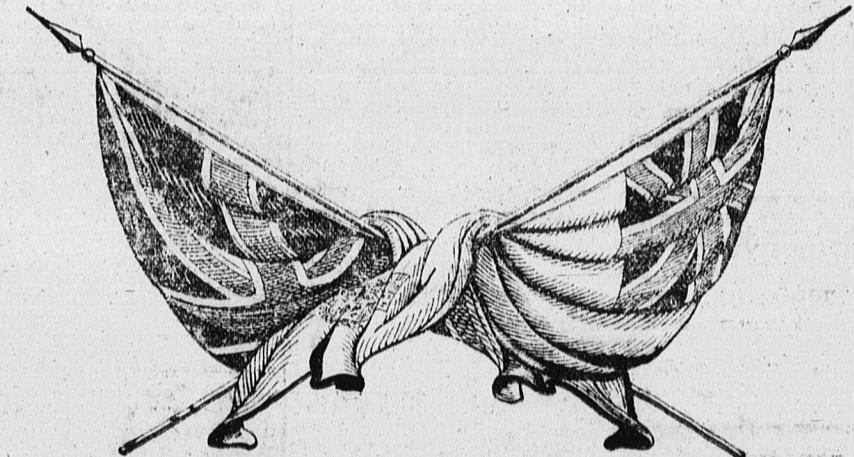
