BRITISH SHIP IN COLLISION WITH FERRY BOAT

HALIFAX, August 26.—A British cruiser and the ferry steamer Dartmouth collided in the harbor, about northeast of the Furness Wharf pier, shortly after 6.30 o'clock last evening. Two passages on the ferry steamer were slightly shaken up. One end of the men's cabin and the part of the cabin covering the paddle wheel was smashed.

Dense fog prevailed at the time of the accident. The cruiser was steaming down and the ferry steamer was on her way to Dartmouth. She had not been out from her dock more than five minutes. Captain Allan, who was in charge of the ferry steamer, blew the whistle at the regular intervals.

The heaviest part of the damage to the cabin was done by the anchor and guns on the cruiser. The cruiser struck the ferry steamer on the starboard side and it is fortunate that loss of life did not result.

THE FOX INDUSTRY

Sir,—Before leaving for Montreal after a most pleasant stay on the Island, where my wife and I have enjoyed to the letter the open-hearted hospitality of your people, I desire to say something regarding the Island's great fur-farming industry, in which I am deeply interested.

It seems to me that with few exceptions, the majority of those engaged in the industry understand all about the practical side, and that the breeding, most successfully, I must say, but they lack in knowledge of matters of great importance to the Island's control of this great industry.

For instance, I find many of your people somewhat blue over present conditions, entirely due to the war, and if they would only stand together and view matters seriously, this war is going to put the fur-farming business on a strong financial basis.

The recent period passed was responsible for a great deal of wild-cattening by the professional promoter, and his personal financial gain was the reason for the high prices, in other words the public was more considered than the actual fur-farming.

The greedy promoter cares nothing for the dividends, as long before the ranches reaches the breeding stage, he has made a "clean-up," in other words his pockets are well filled.

Now what do we see to-day? A lack of co-operation among the several breeders. This is to be regretted. Every breeder on the Island should say: "This war will some day be over, and then the banks will release their immense resources, and the demand will be greater than ever."

If the breeders stampee, or get "cold feet," what will happen? The rich Americans and others know that what I say is right and to-day their representatives are buying up the best foxes available, and if the Islanders don't stand together some day they will find the fur-farming in the hands of Americans.

I was under the impression that the "Fox Parliament" as a body long before this, would have given publicity to my proposition, and I expected that the idea of restricting the sale of any foxes from the Island until the close of the war would have been unanimously decided on by this.

Personally I have every confidence in fur-farming, and the only drawback to its future will come from the lack of loyalty shown by the Islanders themselves.

Many have made money, big money too, right here on the Island, and there should be some way of advancing money to the poor rancher to carry him over the cost of feeding, until the cessation of the war.

The future of the business is most encouraging and the demand for animals will be greater than ever, and if you, Islanders, sell your animals at sacrifice prices, when the demand comes, and come it will, you'll have no animals to sell.

What do I see right here in Charlottetown? Dr. Leo Frank, formerly a co-director of ours, busy building an up-to-date ranch, right in front of your very door. What does this mean? That somebody has the confidence in the business as I here try to impress

upon you.
