

Cleveland Wins Fourth Straight; White Sox Enter Win Column

(Canadian Press)

Lou Boudreau's pitching Cleveland Indians received plenty of support from an unheralded hitting department yesterday and when the game ended they had boasted to their fourth straight American League triumph as they turned back the Detroit Tigers 7-4.

The Chicago White Sox finally entered the victory column when they came from behind to nose out the St. Louis Browns 4-1. The Browns took the second half of the twin bill 7-6.

Joe McCarthy's Boston Red Sox continued to disappoint the experts as their late rally proved futile and the New York Yankees carved out a 5-4 decision. Philadelphia and Washington split a double-header with the A's taking the opener 4-0 and losing the nightcap, 7-3.

Unloading a home run barrage led by third baseman Ken Keltner, who drove in four runs on two straight homers off Hal Newhouser, Cleveland remained unbeaten atop the American League.

First baseman Eddie Robinson also homered and catcher Jim Egan knocked in two runs with a triple as the rampaging Tribe climaxed a sweep of the three-game series here with a 10-hit assault good for 22 bases. Newhouser, who lasted six innings, yielded all but one of the Indians runs and was charged with his first defeat of the year.

The White Sox broke up a 1-1 tie in the eighth of the first game to get their first victory of the season 4-1.

The Browns opened the second game scoring with Bob Dillinger picking on the first pitch for a home run.

Chicago continued its comeback attempt in the sixth with three straight singles.

The Sox picked up one more in the eighth when Jim Delaney scored left fielder Wright for the sixth run.

St. Louis began the scoring in the opening tilt when Sam Zoldak scored on Bob Dillinger's single in the third inning.

Chicago batters got to Zoldak briefly in the sixth to tie the game and picked up the winning marker in the eighth with two out.

Tony Lupien, Wright and Dave Philley singled.

A four-run, ninth-inning Boston rally against southpaw Ed Lopat fell short by one run as Joe Page saved the game for the Yankees.

He relieved Lopat in the ninth with one on and one out and fanned pitcher Murrell Jones and Johnny Pesky to end the contest.

The three game series drew 156,535 fans, a record for an opening American League series at Yankee Stadium.

Joe DiMaggio homered with Phil Rizzuto and Johnny Lindell on base. This was at the expense of John McCall, who started for the Sox.

A crowd of 24,000 jammed Shibe Park and saw homers by Eddie Joost and Hank Majeski account for all of the Philadelphia A's runs in the second game.

The Senators were behind 3-2 when they struck hard at the offerings of left-hander Lou Brissie. Before the seventh inning was over the Nats had lashed out three triples and a single.

Meantime, three Washington pitchers held the A's to three hits, all off winning pitcher Ray Scarborough who started.

The A's made nine hits off Sid Hudson in the opener, and four of them came in the second inning accounting for all of Philadelphia's four runs.

TORONTO, April 25 — (CP) — Coach Buck Boucher pulled a rabbit out of his hat in the third period Saturday afternoon and gave Ottawa Senators a berth in the Allan Cup finals as they edged the veteran Hamilton Tigers 4-3 to win the eastern senior hockey title.

With the score tied late in the final frame, Boucher elected to play wide open hockey. A series of rink-length dashes took the stretch out of the crippled, leg-weary Tigers. Their defenses sagged and Emilie Dagenais battled by a rebound for the goal that broke up the long, hard-fought series.

The eastern champions left Ottawa tonight for Regina where they meet Edmonton Flyers Wednesday in the first game of the best-of-seven series for the Allan Cup.

The 9,169 fans who watched the sudden-death contest following the deadlocked best-of-five series saw the Tigers make the most of their opportunities.

Giants Win Three To Take Top Spot In National League

New York Giants turned loose all their power against Boston Braves today and came up with a pair of triumphs to take over first place in the National League.

Catcher Walker Cooper connected for a round tripper in the 10th inning with the bases loaded to give the New Yorkers the opener 6-2. They also took the nightcap, blanking Braves 6-0 to give them three week-end triumphs as they downed Boston 16-9 Saturday.

Fine pitching continued to raise the hopes of Philadelphia Phillies fans with Dutch Leonard turning back Brooklyn 6-3 today to place Phils in second spot. The Phils dropped a 11-4 decision to Dodgers Saturday.

A one-hit pitching performance by rookie screwball Russ Meyer gave Chicago Cubs a 3-1 verdict over St. Louis Cardinals. Cubs also won Saturday, whipping Cards 6-2.

In a twin bill at Cincinnati, Reds and Pittsburgh each took a game, Cincinnati capturing the opener 7-6 while Pirates outthrew Reds 13-10 in the nightcap. Saturday saw Pirates coming out on top 7-1.

Newcomer Sheldon Jones pitched a two-hit triumph for the Giants in the second game before 35,954.

The Giants rode to triumph in the first game as Cooper's smashing 10th inning home run.

After a rocky start in the nightcap in which he walked the first two batters and hit another, Jones retired the next 11 Bostonians in succession before issuing one of four bases on balls.

First hit off Jones was by Ed Stanky in the fifth and the only other safety was by Phil Masi in the seventh.

ARCADIA, Calif., April 25—Dr. Stanton and Jimmy Creed, favorites with 14,375 Grand Circuit patrons, won their respective races at Santa Anita Park Saturday in final tune-ups for the \$50,000 Golden West Pace next Saturday.

Dr. Stanton, winning his 35th race in 43 starts, captured one section of the San Diego free-for-all pace, travelling the 1 1/8 miles in two minutes, 17.2 seconds. Jimmy Creed won his division at the same distance in 2:18. Both divisions carried purses of \$3,750.

Dr. Stanton eased up approaching the wire and Indian Land, driven by little Joe O'Brien of New Glasgow, N.S. was second in the nine-horse field. Dr. Stanton paid \$2.80, \$2.50 and \$2.30; Jimmy Creed \$4.50, \$3.20 and \$2.50.

O'Brien, reared at Alberton, P. E. I., where his father still owns the Alberton Trotting Park, also finished second in the first race with Spring Flower.

The 30-year-old Canadian rider is the second driver for Castle Farm and assistant trainer under the veteran Sep Pallin. O'Brien's main ambition is to prove himself against major competition during the current Grand Circuit season. Last year he scored 128 victories in 81 days of driving on Canadian and New England tracks.

TORONTO, April 25—Port Arthur West End Bruins, pre-game underdogs, ran wild here Saturday night to score a convincing 10-8 victory over Barrie Flyers in the opening game of their best-of-seven final for the Canadian junior hockey championship.

The two clubs meet again here Monday night, with the odds likely to swing in favor of Bruins.

The Western champions surprised the 13,075 fans by taking control of the game at the opening face-off and never relinquishing the lead, although Barrie outscored the winners 5-2 in the last period.

Rudy Migay, star with last year's Memorial Cup champion Toronto St. Michael's College, was the big gun for the winners, firing three goals. Shifty Danny Lewicki and Alfie Childs came next with a brace apiece.

Billy Barrett and Whit Mousseau paced the Eastern champion Flyers with two goals apiece.

Gerard Cote's feat of beating the pick of the continent in the Boston Marathon should assure his place as Canada's No. 1 Olympic candidate. It was his fourth win in the event and all Canada thrilled to the achievement.

Subsequent sporting events such as baseball openings and hockey playdowns have crowded Cote's remarkable performance from the sports pages, but give a thought to this St. Hyacinthe marathoner whom Elmer (Montreal Herald) Ferguson calls "the greatest athlete in all Canadian history if you wish to make your rating on sheer performance — and why not?"

In his younger days Cote aspired to be a boxer. Then, relates Ferny Cote began, reading of the exploits of such great runners as the late Edouard Fabre, Pete Gayray, the late Johnny Salo, Jote Ray, Arthur Newton.

He took up running and trained faithfully. He found he lacked bursts of speed but had stamina. He decided to become a marathon runner.

Night after night Cote ran along the shaded streets of St. Hyacinthe. In winter he came to Montreal to jog along the reaches of Notre Dame Street East, cleared of snow.

Two days before his first Boston marathon, in 1936, Cote ran the full distance. When the race came he could hardly run at all.

Before his 1940 victory he didn't even put on his running shoes for three days before the race. In 1944 he had to call on both genueness and stamina in beating the great Johnny Kelly by only 12 3-8 seconds.

UNION LOSS HEAVY

In the American Civil War an estimated 350,000 Union troops lost their lives compared with 130,000 Confederate troops.
