Right Of Municipalities To Tax Crown Property Discussed In Commons

OTTAWA, Nov. 16 - (CP) - Members on both sides of the Commons today discussed the government to amend the British North America Act so municipalities could tax crown property. The members suggested the amendment be made or that some action be taken to see that municipalities were compensated for the revenue they lose from being unable to collect taxes on federal government buildings. The discussion was set off on a government resolution to a bill authorizing a grant of \$300,000 to the city of Ottawa for services to federal buildings. Works Minister Fournier, sponsor of the resolution, said in Ottawa that he felt the situation in Ottawa different than in other municipalities. Ottawa had grown as the business of government had expanded and he felt it was only just to give the city some compensation for the services and protection to multiple governments' buildings. Other municipalities had grown up independent of government business. Mr. G. Macdonald (L.-Hallifax) suggested that the right of municipalities to tax crown properties should be discussed at the Dominion Provincial Conference. The burden on Halifax as a result of the number of tax-free crown properties there was very heavy. Municipalities should not be bound indefinitely by that section of the B.N.A. act which prevented the taxing of crown property. When that clause was inserted in 1867 the number of federal buildings was "infinitesimal" as compared with today. King Hazen (P.C.-St. John Albert) said he did not think "we could make a job of one constituency and fowl of another." The \$300,000 was to be paid to Ottawa for services rendered. He wondered about the services rendered the city of Ottawa by the government. The government had established in Ottawa the largest industry in the city. Many municipalities would welcome the establishment of the Government and Parliament within their boundaries and would not ask for any special consideration. The grant was to be paid in lieu of taxes then the same principle should apply to all municipalities which had come into being after the resolution.

Bible Society Gen. Secretary Is Speaker Here

At St. Paul's Church yesterday morning the prescholar, the Rev. A. H. Wilkinson, B.D., General Secretary of the British and Foreign Bible Society, London, England, made a most interesting and inspiring address by a word of thanks on behalf of the Parent Society for all the kind messages of sympathy which had come from Canada and Newfoundland. Mr. Wilkinson said that peace in the world has been our quest for many years but seems impossible to attain it. After the last war it was hoped that through the league of nations peace could be had, in the new effort for world peace after this war, we find there are certain reservations which nations will not give up, making it impossible to have a just, workable peace. The world is in a terrible condition. As he travelled through the world he wondered if the condition of things was fully realized. For some one hundred years man seemed to have had a good working machine but in 1914 and 1938 breakdowns occurred. Man may have the seed of perfection, but still has the original sin. We cannot save ourselves. The Bible says that man is but a weak thing. It is as true today as it ever was. It is not of man but of God. The Bible teaches the truth. The brotherhood of man is not a feasible idea unless it means a brotherhood in the Kingdom of God. The Bible teaches these things. The Bible Society intends to go to all the dark places in the world. In 1904 there were 72 languages and the circulation of Scripture was 22,000 copies. After 40 years there were 120 languages and in 1938 the circulation was 2,000,000 copies per year. Since the Bible Society was organized in 1804, 500,000,000 copies of the Bible have been distributed. What is the future for the Society? We will continue to work in the rebuilding of the world, particularly in Europe and Asia. Things are in desperate state with cruelty, warped minds, and people in despair. It will take a mighty effort to right things. There is a supreme place for the Society among churches and people for the Word of God-in their own tongue. In China, India, and in Russia
