ASSISTANCE TO 171 SOLDIERS.—Assistance ranging from \$5 to \$25 a week was given to 171 returned soldiers under the government unemployment relief scheme through the local offices of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment last week. Although about 250 men applied for the relief, all but the 171 were found not to be included in those for whom the assistance can be given.
