Many Features To Be Run In Connection With The Golden Gloves Tourney

IN THIS CORNER

Leo Kelly, fresh from a decision victory over Billy Holm at Campbellton, N.B., is on the shelf again. Recurrence of a hand injury he suffered when training for a fight with Bobby Orr forces the local middleweight to remain idle for a month or six weeks, the injury being examined by a local medic yesterday with the above result.

Again Kelly will be forced to cancel his bout with Bennie Binns as a result of this turn of affairs and yesterday he (Kelly) gave his reason for not going through with his scheduled 12th July match with Binns. He felt that owing to the lay-off caused when he first hurt the hand he needed a tuning-up scrap before meeting Binns. As he hadn't signed any contract for the fight he felt, and rightly so, that he would be within his rights in taking the Holm scrap first.

He wasn't by any means trying to dodge the scrap. He is more than anxious to meet his one-time conqueror and, states Kelly's manager, when the hand is healed perfectly Mr. Binns will be accommodated; he need not have any fears on that matter. Leo has been wanting that scrap for a long time and isn't going to let anything stand in the way of it if he can help it.

Matching of Bill Matich and George Leslie here on August 5th had caused a flurry of excitement throughout the boxing fans of the island. It seems that this Leslie person is picking them tougher and tougher all the time and it is apparent that the more fights he gets the more confident he becomes.

You got to hand it to the big Souris battler. There is hardly a day he is scared of and once he gets an idea into his head it takes a lot of persuasion to knock it out. Matich, as is known to the fighter who defeated Leslie in the White Hope tournament at Toronto and ever since that time George has had it in the back of his mind that some day he would meet up again with Mr. Matich and defeat him.

Now he is going to realize his ambition and if there ever was an opponent Leslie wanted to beat it is Matich. Over a year ago Leslie was talking about the coming fight. Even then he was confident of taking him in a return bout and it shows now that it will be very long before he will be able to show whether or not his confidence in his own ability is justified or not.

There will be a galaxy of fighting amateurs on hand for the Maritime Golden Gloves tournament at the Forum July 20th and 21st. That is becoming more evident every day as entries keep pouring in and the promoters assure us that the three provinces will be well represented.

In regard to the bicycle and road races being staged in connection with the tournament it is an assured fact that both events will provide thrilling action. While the bike race will not have any score of entries or anything near it nevertheless those who will be at the starting line will be the cream of the Maritime Provinces and what a battle they should stage over the gruelling 40-mile route from Summerside.

Rumors were current yesterday that Roy Oliver, Gus Olsen and Noel Paul would be three starters in the 10-mile road race. If such is the case then island race fans will see three of the best in the Maritimes performing. Olsen, Oliver and Paul have thrilled fans in Nova Scotia many a time with brilliant running duels and should the trio make their appearance here, it would certainly assure the race going over in a big way.

Bill Cook has moved out of the big time. Into a minor league berth, which may become a major one in a few years when Cleveland finds out whether hockey is going to keep the new Supthin rink in expected surpluses.

Ask Jim Sutherland, the nearest of Ontario hockey whether he is the greatest of all right wings, and he will hem and haw a bit because the Kingston veteran who broke both into hockey sets a great store on both players.

This Sutherland must have had something on the ball as a coach because he really step to town, and when you develop players like Davidson and Cook, you have done something to make fans remember you by.

Auxiliary to the main event and yet at any other time major attractions, the 40-mile bicycle race and the 10-mile foot race are further reinforced by a modern big Barn Dance as a climax to the final night of the Golden Gloves Tournament.

Barn Dances have been the vogue everywhere, and old-time music and old-time dances hold the spotlight. This will be an enjoyable ending to the Maritime Boxing Championships, held here a week from today for the first time in Island history.

The bicycle and foot races are creating a great deal of interest. Local bike racers will compete at Halifax on July 19th and will bring back with them mainland competitors. In the 10-mile foot grind several of the Maritime star runners, including Oliver, are expected to face the starter.

The main event—the Golden Gloves meet—is taking like wildfire. Entries will greatly exceed the fondest hopes of the promoters. Already seventeen boxers have submitted their entry from this province. Teams of amateur boxers are expected from Sydney, New Waterford, Joggins, N.S., Macaan, N.S., Amherst, St. John, Fredericton, Campbellton, and individual competitors from other points. It is doubtful if any annual boxing championship held in the past can boast as large an entry list.

The eight classes will see all entries in competition on Tuesday night with the winners meeting in the finals on Wednesday night. Among those contenders will be some very clever boxers, some of whom made trial in the Olympic boxing contests a year ago.

The prizes—cups, trophies and medals—will be on display in a few days and contributed by prominent citizens will be judged handsome and appropriate rewards.
