Bandits Try to Fasten Murder Each on Other

ASTOUNDING SCENES IN TRIAL OF HOTRUM AND McFADDEN AT THE TORONTO ASSIZES.

EVIDENCE OF DETECTIVES IN FAVOR OF THE FORMER

Two Officers Testify That Slain Druggist Said Assailant Was a Dark Man.

TORONTO, May 17.—Interest in the trial of Roy Cotrum, charged jointly with William McFadden, of London, Ont., with the murder of Leonard Cecil Sabine, druggist, in this city on the night of March 5 last, was intensified this afternoon when McFadden was put in the witness box at the assizes by Crown Prosecutor Gordon Waldron to give evidence in rebuttal of evidence given by Hotrum.

This was strongly objected to by Hotrum's counsel, W. K. Murphy, who contended that McFadden was not a competent witness for the Crown in rebuttal, though he might be a competent witness for the prosecution in chief. He asserted it was a violation of every principle which Mr. Justice Kelly, the presiding judge, had recognized when he granted separate trials for Hotrum and McFadden.

After about an hour's argument, the judge ruled that McFadden could legally be called as a witness in rebuttal. At this point McFadden's counsel, Fletcher Kerr, asked for the protection of the Crown for his client while on the witness stand, and this was promised.

The trial has developed into a contest between Hotrum and McFadden as to which can convict the other of having fired the fatal shot in the Sabine drug store. Hotrum, in his testimony in his own defence today, declared that McFadden rushed into the store while Hotrum stayed at the door, which was open.

"I didn't get in," Hotrum swore, "for by the time I got to the door the shot was fired. My gun was not drawn then, nor at any other time that night."

McFadden's Version.

McFadden absolutely denied this. "I was outside when Hotrum went in," he said on the witness stand.

"I heard a shot. Then 'Patsy' (Hotrum) came out and we hurried to the car. I asked him 'for God's sake what did you want to do that for?'"

At the conclusion of McFadden's evidence the court adjourned until tomorrow morning. The case will likely go to the jury tomorrow early. The trial of William McFadden probably will start on Monday.

McFadden, in his evidence, denied most of Hotrum's statements on the witness stand. He admitted that Hotrum's statement as to having received a revolver from Jack Conley before the pair left for the drug store was correct. This weapon, he said, was a "big black gun," and was the one from which the shot had been fired that killed Sabine. Before he and Hotrum left the car for the drug store Conley asked him (McFadden) if he had a gun, and he replied that he had not.

"Did you have a gun?" the Crown counsel asked.

"I did not have a gun," McFadden replied.

Hotrum gave a circumstantial and detailed account of the tragedy, filling in the gap which was left blank by the evidence of Walter Hulse, the chauffeur, and Jack Conley, the other gangster, who remained in the automobile on the night of the tragedy, while McFadden and Hotrum walked over to the corner of Manning and Harbord with the intention of robbing the Sabine drug store.

Hotrum said that McFadden had been drinking on the night of the tragedy, and that he appeared nervous and excited. He added that McFadden was the man with the "black-barreled revolver" and the bullet that killed the druggist. The accused said that while McFadden went into the Sabine store, he went only as far as the door. When the shot was fired, he said, he ran. If there had been a fight, said Hotrum in his evidence, he would have taken part in it, but as it was he never drew his revolver.

Detectives' Evidence

Detective Sergeant Arthur Levitt testified that when he went to Western Hospital, Sabine had described his assailant as "having a devilish grin on his face, showing his teeth when he shot me." The slayer had used "a long, slim revolver." He was "rather dark complexion, quite noticeably thin featured, and was about 25 years old. He was about five feet six or seven inches all."

Detective Levitt recounted how Sabine had said that the man with the gun stood only a few paces from him. The second bandit had had nothing to say, and had taken no part in the shooting. The detective repeated his statement that Sabine had described his slayer as "darkish complexioned."

W. K. Murphy, counsel for the accused, asked whether the witness would call Hotrum "dark," and received the answer, "No."

The counsel then read the police circular which gave the prisoner's official description as "fair."

Detective Sergeant Frank Hazelwood, who was with Levitt, gave his version of what Sabine had told them. The druggist, he said, had described his assailant as "rather dark complexioned," but "white faced and thin here," pointing to his face under the cheek bones.

Assistant Inspector of Detectives Wallace on being recalled to the witness stand identified an envelope which had been found in an overcoat claimed by Hotrum. On this envelope was marked down "Gerard 4296" the phone number of the Hannam Garage at 8 Moscov avenue, where Walter Hulse, the chauffeur was employed.

ARMENIANS LEAVING CELICA

NEW YORK, May 13.—Announcement that the French troops would be withdrawn from the Cilicia district of Turkey as a result of negotiations with the Turkish Nationalists caused a panic among the Armenian residents there, says Dr. J. K. Martin, a relief worker at Amiab, in a report sent to the Near East Relief.

Dr. Martin said that most of the Armenians were leaving that city as fast as they could and that the poorer people who could not afford to leave were almost distraught with fear. The Turks have become bolder and more threatening since reports of the contemplated French evacuations were received.

The missionary quoted a reported boast of the Moslems that they

would rebuild their shattered mosques and minaret with Christian skulls and says this has not failed to have its effect on the Armenians. Dr. Martin added:

"An Armenian said to me: 'We would all of us go calmly, joyfully, to some desert place if only permission were given us. We would prefer to die of hunger and starvation many times rather than once again fall into the hands of the inhuman Turks.'"

"The Armenians see themselves again going to the slaughter with not a hand in all the world raised in their defence or a voice uttered in protest. The nations of the world sit around, look on and continue to cast lots. Yet we trust that in some way, we do not know how, deliverance will come."
