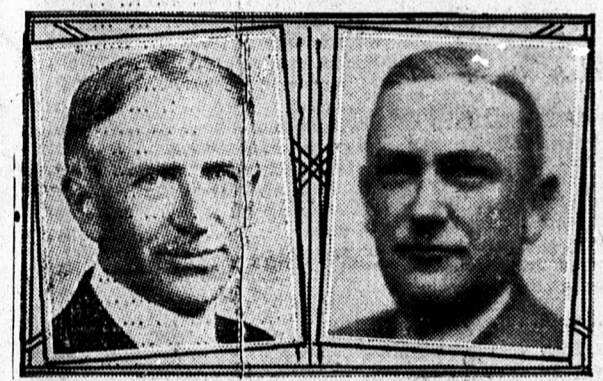

STOCK SALEMEN AND LEGAL ADVISER ARE UNDER ARREST

TORONTO, Dec. 27.—Three men were arrested late last night by Detectives Tuft and Hogan on charges of conspiracy in connection with the selling of stock in the Central and Maritime Development Corporation, Limited, of 18 Toronto Street.

The men arrested are: John T. Loftus, Natalie Street, legal adviser of the firm; Michael Conroy, Jarvis Street, stock salesman, and James Leggett, Carlton Street, also a salesman. The three are charged jointly with conspiracy, while a second charge, one of theft of \$1,400 from Leggett.

The men, it is alleged, were selling stock in the corporation, supposed to have land in Nova Scotia on which a mine was located. Police charge the property is only farm land and not as valuable as represented. Just what amount is involved, police could not make known last night. Bail for the accused was set at \$5,000 each.

THE VOGUE

Prof. Emanuel Violin Soloist And Teacher

Violin, Soloist and Teacher.

Prof. Oscar M. Emanuel, violin soloist and teacher, is one of the most successful and promising violinists of New England. He began to play the violin when he was eight years old and for a long time under Prof. Felix Winternetz, and later graduated from the New England Conservatory of Music. Prof. Oscar M. Emanuel has found that his skill with his favorite instrument has been in demand in various directions. He has played frequently in public in concert work, and was for four seasons on the B. F. Keith Circuit and also with the Boston Symphony Orchestra as soloist.

In his teaching Prof. Emanuel gives the most careful instruction suited to individual needs and temperaments. He makes his teaching both interesting and effective by the use of the modern Leopold Auer method. He has had fifteen years of experience in teaching and is confident of his ability. Many competent musical critics have united in the opinion that he imparts a rich tone to his playing and he shows a fine degree of technique in all his work.

Prof. Emanuel adds to his pronounced ability as a violinist and as a teacher a most pleasing and agreeable personality. He plays a very fine Italian violin, known as the Gabrielli, made in the year 1750 which was brought over from Europe by him. 28-11.




