CHRISTMAS MAILS FOR OVERSEAS—On account of the International Situation, particulars in regard to sailing dates of ships carrying mails to other countries cannot be announced, and it is not possible in year to advertise the latest opportunities for the despatch of Christmas mails for destinations which require ocean transportation. Some delay in the transmission of mails overseas may occur owing to the disarrangement of many mail services abroad. Members of the public are informed that no information can be given regarding the despatch of mails for places abroad, but they should post their correspondence and parcels as early as possible.

MINOR ACCIDENTS—A number of minor car accidents occurred over the week end as rain and light snow presented a slippery surface on the paved highways of the province. Last night a car was reported to have turned over outside Fredericton on the Charlottetown - Borden highway. Details of this accident were unavailable. Another car accident was reported to have occurred at Millville yesterday but Royal Canadian Mounted Police said last night they had no report of it. On Saturday a motor car and truck were involved in a collision at the River. Both vehicles were slightly damaged but the occupants of both escaped injury. A car from Montreal turned over several times in the ditch on the Malpeque Road, near St. Dunstan's College, Friday night, but both occupants escaped serious injury.

STORE BURGLARIZED—Burglary entered the general store of McGowan's Limited, Kilnash, four miles from Montague, it was learned Saturday. Entrance was made late Friday night or early Saturday morning. Loot included the cash register and a "large quantity" of cigars. Exact amount of money involved or the number of cigarettes taken was not learned. Entrance to the building was made by means of a rear window. A somewhat similar break was made last fall, it was recalled, but the amount of loot then was understood to be less. Members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police detachment here are investigating. The carrying off of the cash register recalled the burglarizing of a county store at Five Houses, King's County community 20 miles from Charlottetown, earlier this year. At Five Houses a small safe was broken open and a large sum of money was discovered several weeks later in a barn and had been broken open and looted.

POTATO HARVESTING HAMPERED—Unfavorable weather conditions continue to hamper potato growers in this province in the harvesting of their crop. Probably ten to fifteen per cent of the crop are still in the ground. Heavy snow squalls yesterday, following rain on Saturday, threatened to further delay work this week. Meanwhile the threat of heavy frost was increasing as the end of October neared. Usually the final freeze-up does not come until late in November, but on the occasional year heavy frost is experienced in the first week of November. In addition to unharvested potatoes, many acres of turnips are still in the field. Already frost damages partially destroyed 20 per cent of the island's potato crop. It is estimated that the extent of the damage will be all dug and put into storage. The frost degree of frost this week was in the range of 10 to 15 degrees below zero in an October cold wave which brought five inches of snow. Last night the ground was again white as heavy snow squalls followed in quick succession all day. Motor traffic was not interrupted, although dirt roads were fast becoming inches deep with mud.

Veterans Guard Hold Church Parade Here

Citizens of Charlottetown yesterday morning were reminded of the late Great War as they witnessed 130 smartly stepping members of the Veterans Guard of Canada march through city streets on church parade. The men taking part in the parade, the unit then returned to their homes. The parade, presented a fine appearance as they marched, heedless of the falling snow and wet streets, in a sodderly manner from the Ordnance grounds to church. Citizens lined the route of the procession to view the marching soldiers. The men lined up at the Ordnance Grounds, where they are stationed, and headed by the L.O.A. Band, under the direction of Pip Major Joseph Duncan, began 11:21 church parade. The commander-in-chief, Major R. H. Duvar, was in charge of the Veterans' Guard as they marched via Brighton R. to Queen street, the corner of Grafton and Queen, where the Catholic party, under the leadership of Capt. James J. Leightner, second in command of the Guard, continued via Queen, Richmond and Great George streets to St. Dunstan's Basilica, where mass was celebrated by Rev. J. P. O'Hanley. The sermon was preached by Rev. J. W. McCordle. Meanwhile the Protestant party in charge of the parade had proceeded via Grafton and Pownall streets to St. James Presbyterian church. Here the services were in charge of the Rev. R. Moore, head legate, D.D., who preached a fitting sermon for the occasion. Following the ceremony, the party proceeded via Queen, Richmond and Richmond streets, where they were joined at the corner of Great George and Richmond streets by the Catholic party. The unit then returned to quarters via Richmond, Prince, Kent, Queen streets and Brighton Road.

FUNERAL OF MR. W. L. POOLE AT MONTAGUE
William Leith Poole was laid to rest Friday afternoon in the cemetery at Lower Montague, following a funeral service in the United Church at Montague. The funeral was one of the largest ever held in that section of the island for some time, friends coming from different parts of the province to pay their last tributes of respect to one who in his day was one of the leading figures in the commercial life of the province and who was held in the highest respect and esteem. Among those in attendance were Lieutenant Governor LeFevre, Hon. Dr. Thane A. Campbell, Premier, and members of the Government. The late Mr. Poole had been Past Master of the Masonic Lodge at Montague and members of that lodge and other Masons were present in a body. In the church Rev. S. E. Hayward officiated, assisted by Rev. John Sling of Georgetown. The hymns "We are a Friend We Have in Jesus" and "Abide With Me" were sung by the choir and Allison MacLean rendered the beautiful solo, "One Sweetly Solemn Thought." Rev. Mr. Hayward in the course of his address paid an eloquent and fitting tribute to the late Mr. Poole. At the grave Mr. Hayward and the Masons conducted the services. The honorary pallbearers were C. B. Green, A. C. MacKay, Maynard P. MacDonald, R. E. MacDonald, Harry W. Stewart, W. A. Johnstone, L. H. Coffin and H. J. Mabon. The active pallbearers were R. K. Clements, A. E. Campbell, William MacLean, P. Keyes, William Stewart, and Cecil Campbell.

130 Members Of Veterans Guard Settled Here

The members of the Veterans Guard of Canada are now comfortably settled in their quarters at the Ordnance Compound on Brighton Shore. The building they are occupying was built in 1880 and was last used as a billet for soldiers in 1868. When fully recruited the Guard will consist of 170 returned soldiers. Ten men from the western part of the province are expected to join their ranks today, and this will bring the unit up to full strength. Major R. H. Duvar, of Charlottetown, has been appointed Commanding Officer of the Guard, and second in command is Capt. James J. Leightner, also of Charlottetown. Under the guidance of these two men and a capable staff of officers and N.C.O.'s, the veterans are training daily to be ready for "the primary defence of the island" and general security of the island which is their allotted duty. After an absence of training for close to 25 years, the old soldiers are quickly

attaining their former efficiency, which was of such great assistance in winning the last war. They are members of the Canadian Active Service Force and in a few weeks will be ready to take their place at any point their services are required.

Reveille sounds at 7 a.m. and the men roll out for another busy day, and at 7.30 sit down to a breakfast of porridge with milk and sugar, bacon or eggs, bread, butter and the choice of tea and coffee. Fortified by this morning meal, the veterans, like other active service forces, go through a hard morning's drill which commences at 9, and finishes at 11.30 o'clock. At dinner the men are served roast beef, potatoes, vegetables, pudding, bread, tea or coffee. Twice a week they receive fish for this meal which is served at 12 o'clock. At 1.30 the men again commence their drill which continues until 4 o'clock. One hour later supper, consisting of potatoes, macaroni, beans, fish pie, and bread, but no coffee. Following this the veterans are free until 10 o'clock, when they must be back to barracks for the night. Many old acquaintances of former years have been renewed at the

camp, as men who have not met since they fought together in the last war are once again in the same unit. The Guard members are arrayed in battle dress and on every parade and drill win the admiration of the spectators for their smart appearance. Forty members of the Guard who recently arrived back to the province from Sydney after spending some time on service there, are at present sleeping in rooms at the Armouries but eat and drill at the Ordnance Grounds. In addition to the regular training, three Junior officers and four N.C.O.'s are taking an advanced training course by attending night sessions where they are instructed by Major Walter Hyndman. The men are accepted for the Guard according to their record of service in the World War. Those having served in France are given the preference, those who served in England are taken next and lastly, those who served only in Canada. All ex-service men are eligible, even though they do not belong to a Canadian Legion branch in the province. The latter organization selects the men, however.
