THE PROHIBITION ACT, 1900.

We reprint in full this morning the text of the Prohibitory Act passed at last year's session of the Legislature. We do this for the information of all concerned as the Act will come into force on 5th June next, and it is desirable that all should become acquainted with its provisions. We trust that our temperance readers, as well as those engaged in the sale or purchase of liquors will carefully peruse its provisions, in order that the law may be obeyed, or if not obeyed that the means provided for its enforcement may be fully understood.

At the present time the new law will apply to Charlottetown only, as the Canada Temperance Act is in force in the Counties. In the event of the Canada Temperance Act being hereafter abrogated in any one of the Counties the Prohibition Act would at once take its place there, so that from the fifth of June forward so long as the Act remains on the statute book the entire Province must be and remain under prohibition in one form or the other. This is a matter for sincere congratulation to the friends of temperance and social order, and we believe it accords fully with the sentiments of a large majority of the people of the Island.

As for the law itself we are confident that it is valid in every respect. The weaknesses found in the Manitoba Prohibition Act by the Court of King's Bench in that Province are not found in our Act. It will be observed also that the penalties prescribed by the Island Prohibition Act are decidedly heavier than under the Scott Act, being \$100 for the first offence, \$200 for the second offence, and imprisonment for six months without the option of a fine for the third and every subsequent offence.

The Examiner makes a good suggestion with regard to providing a landing-place for pleasure boats during the summer at the steps near Fort Edward, and also for securing good order at the Park on Sundays. The increasing popularity of the Park as a resort renders this latter provision important.

The esteemed Examiner is solicitous that THE GUARDIAN shall make a further statement as to the Provincial finances. We see no necessity for doing so. In the meantime we have no doubt that any light which the Examiner can throw upon the public accounts will be taken for all it is worth. So far our contemporary has not discussed the accounts with very much clearness or vigor. On a second trial perhaps better results may follow.

The important announcement is made that civil administration has been established at Pictou, and civil courts will now take the place of the military tribunals. In these courts the English language will be used alone for the present. We do not understand that this is a permanent arrangement, although it would doubtless be better for all concerned in the long run if the English language were made the sole official language of the country for the future.

Mr. W. S. Louson of this city has received from Mr. H. W. Wadsworth, Montreal, Secretary of the Dominion Commercial Travellers' Association, under date of April 9, a letter of enquiry which runs as follows: "It has been reported to me that the P. E. I. Legislature at their coming session propose to introduce a bill increasing the tax on commercial travellers from \$20, the present rate, to \$30. Can you say if this rumor is true? If so something must be done to fight it. I shall be glad if you will keep me informed."
