THE COOK'S CORNER

Tomato Cutlets (Diabetic)

Half a pound tomatoes. One and a half tablespoons Plasmion. One ounce butter. One tablespoonful cream. One egg, seasoning to taste. Slice the tomatoes in butter till tender. Rub through a sieve. Put the pulp back in a pan and mix one tablespoonful of Plasmion slowly. Add the cream and seasoning. Cook gently till quite thick. Do not boil. Pour on to a plate, when cold make into cutlets, brush over with egg and Plasmion. Fry in boiling fat. Serve with brown gravy.

Apple Salad

Melt a heaped tablespoonful of lard in a little water. Take half a pint of well flavoured apple pulp, mix well with half a pint of cream, and place in a saucepan with the lard. Let it simmer for a few minutes, stirring all the time. Add a tablespoonful of brandy, pour into a bowl, and keep on ice or in a cool place till next day.

Floor Polish

Break up a cupful of beeswax, put this in a two-pound stone jar. Place in a warm oven until wax has melted. Cover this with turpentine. Replace in the oven, and heat slowly for another fifteen minutes. Strain well, let it set, when it will be ready for storing in tins. If thick, more turpentine can be added.

There is no Age Limit to the Folly of Love: Middle-Aged Men and Women Who Know all the Danger Signals by Heart Pick Just as Unsuitable Mates as Giddy Youth—and Then are Amazed When They Land in the Divorce Hospital

A woman is asking for a divorce on the ground that when she married she was too young and unsophisticated to be able to make a wise choice of a life mate. This brings up a most interesting problem: How old must one be to achieve discretion in matters of the affections? At what time in life, if any, has one learned enough worldly wisdom and acquired sufficient knowledge of men and women to be able to choose a wife or husband with unerring judgment?

As far as we can see, all ages are the age of indiscretion in marriage, and there is no period between the cradle and the grave where we are given any special discretion or hunches to guide us in the matter of choosing mates. Even experience seems to teach nothing, for we see callow youth and tottering age making the same blunders, and old rounders picking out just as misty brides as schoolboys.

Nobody will contend that the very young are any more capable of picking out suitable life partners than they are of playing the stock market. Occasionally one will get a winner through sheer luck, but 99 per cent of them go bankrupt in heart and purse.

The woman who says that at 19 she was too ignorant and unsophisticated to know how to pick out a husband speaks only the bare truth, and she speaks for all youth.

For what does a girl in her teens know about men? Absolutely nothing. She judges a boy by his looks, by his line, by the way he dances, by the make of his automobile. She doesn't even know whether he has any brains or ambitions or serious purpose in life. She doesn't even know whether he can make a living for her or not. She doesn't look into the future because today is the limit of time for the young. They are concerned with nothing beyond.

Nor does the boy know anything more about women. If a girl is pretty and gay and a peppy dancer and good at sports, it is all he asks. He doesn't even try to find out if she has any brains and backbone and is the sort who will stand up under the trials of marriage, or will turn quitter.

Worse still, these poor young things don't even know what sort of men and women they are going to make themselves when they mature, nor what kind of husbands and wives they are going to want and need when their tastes are developed and their own characters formed. For our tastes in people change just as radically as they do in clothes and food and amusements, and the boys and girls that we found so enchanting when we were sweet and 20 generally bore us to tears at 30.

Considering, then, the pitfalls that youth stumbles into through ignorance, one would think that age would be a protection against making matrimonial blunders. It would seem that the man and woman who were worldly wise, and who had had the time and opportunity not only to study themselves but many other men and women, would play a matrimonial system that could not be beaten.

Off hand, you would say that these are wise old birds who can't be fooled. You would say that they had seen too many synthetic orange blends without the perfume of love to be sure that they were getting the real thing when they married. COURSE FOR FISHERMEN

The Biological Board of Canada offers to assist a limited number of fishermen from the Maritime Provinces to attend the Short Course for Fishermen to be given at the Fisheries Experimental Station, Halifax, N. S. during a term of four weeks commencing on January 24th, 1934. Each will be given on completion of the course the sum of \$32.00, plus the amount of railway fare for a return trip between Halifax and the railway station nearest his home. Only bona fide fishermen from 17 to 35 years of age, who have passed through grade 6 in the public schools of the Maritime Provinces or an equivalent grade, will be able to obtain these grants. All applications must be in by January 19th, and should be addressed to the Fisheries Experimental Station, Halifax, N. S.
