POOR PASTOR MADE WEALTHY

Sudden Fortune for a P. E. I. Clergyman

Rev. A. M. McDonald Struggling Along on Small Salary Suddenly made Rich by Parishioner's Death.

BATH, Me., April 20.—Suddenly elevated from the position of pastor of a small church with a comparatively small pitance yearly to the place of heir to \$300,000 is the unusual experience of Rev. Angus M. McDonald of the Congregational Church of Bar Harbor. This fortune was bequeathed him by the late Mrs. Abbie R. Dodge of Jacksonville, Fla. Mr. McDonald, who was named by Mrs. Dodge as the executor of her will, is now in Jacksonville settling up the estate. When he returns to Maine it will be a rich man.

The rustle of silken skirts, the frou-frou of laces, the sleek, well-groomed look of the men in his summer congregation, no longer can be a source of regret to him. He can take his place and hold his head high among the Smart Setters who found in his sermons on Sundays religion enough to carry them through a week of pleasure.

Rev. Mr. McDonald is thirty-six years old. He was born on Prince Edward Island and at the age of eleven years moved to this city with his parents, his father having become foreman in a lumber yard. Graduating from the Bath high school with high honors in 1886, he went to Bowdoin College, from which he was graduated in 1890, and three years later was graduated from Andover Seminary.

His first pastorate was at the Union Congregational church in Jacksonville. A judge of human nature, and always of a genial and sunny disposition he won many friends. Among them was Mrs. Abbie R. Dodge, a widow. She was one of the prominent members of the church and she watched the progress and development of the young clergyman and encouraged him in his labors. When the new minister thought that a new house of worship was needed, he found a firm friend in Mrs. Dodge and she subscribed \$1,500. Even then the work of raising the sum was hard, but his pluck and perseverance won out and his reward was one of the handsomest church edifices in Jacksonville.

He married Miss Annie McLeod of Boston in 1897 and took her to the newly built parsonage with him to live. Mrs. Dodge was one of the first to meet her and she approved of the clergyman's mate becoming a frequent caller at the parsonage. Upon one occasion she accompanied them to Bath, when they came on a visit to their pastor's father and mother.

During the big fire at Jacksonville a few years ago, the Union Congregational church was burned. Mrs. Dodge as before, came to the rescue. After the new church was completed, Mr. McDonald resigned and less than two years ago moved to Bar Harbor to take charge of the fashionable Congregational church.

Last month he was notified of the serious illness of Mrs. Dodge and hastened to Jacksonville. He reached there a few
