LETTERS TO THE BOARD OF TRADE.

When the Board of Trade held its meeting to discuss the proposed guarantee of the Packing Company's bonds a number of letters were submitted but not read from persons in various parts of the Island who were unable to attend. These letters were as uniformly hostile to the proposal as were the persons who attended the meeting. We subjoin a few extracts, each being from a different letter.

"As to guaranteeing the bonds of the Dominion Packing Company I am personally decidedly opposed to it and have yet to find any one in this vicinity who expresses a different opinion."

"I have had conversations with several persons and their opinions were that the Government would not act wisely to enter into such an arrangement at the present time."

"I have never yet heard any one in this district speak in favor of the action of the Government in backing the Company and personally I strongly disapprove of the Government becoming security to the bonds of any company to any extent."

"It appears to us to look as if the Company are saying to the farmers of this province, 'Supply us with hogs and lend us the money and we will start business.' As far as we can at present see we think the scheme should be strongly opposed."

"We are opposed to combinations and trusts of every kind, for their history is that of making money at the great disadvantage of those who are unable to compete with them. We have heard many expressions of condemnation from very prominent parties."

"We as directors of the Dundas Dairy Association express our disapproval of the Prince Edward Island Government guaranteeing any company's bonds for the purpose of carrying on a business on this Island." Signed by six Directors and the Secretary.

"It is the opinion of nearly all in this section that the Government should not guarantee the bonds of the Dominion Packing Co. They consider that some better arrangement could be made whereby the products of the Island could be handled."

"It is deemed very injurious that the Government of the Province should become liable as guarantors for the bonds of the Company. If the Company is financially strong why ask for a guarantee?"

"I may say I think the Government would do better in the interest of our Province to have nothing to do with guaranteeing the bonds of any company, much less the bonds of a foreign one."

"As to the guarantee, we prefer to say nothing until we better understand why it is asked and the security offered."

"In conversation with my neighbors, the general opinion amongst us is that the Government has no right to assist any private enterprise unless it can be shown to be of undoubted benefit to the country at large."

"It is the opinion of a great many in this section whom I have spoken to that

If the Government have really pledged themselves to guarantee the bonds of the Dominion Packing Co. they have made a serious mistake and opened the door to a genuine monopoly, which in a short time will injure the farmers as well as the laboring class and business men."

"I may say for myself and others whom I have been talking with, that we are altogether opposed to the government guaranteeing the bonds of the Dominion Packing Company, or giving them any privilege for a term of years that might prove very unsatisfactory in time to come. The time would probably come when we would be clamoring to have their privileges annulled as we now do those of the Telegraph Company."

"The almost universal opinion of people in this is one of determined opposition to giving any Government guarantee of bonds of the Dominion Packing Co. and especially so in the absence of any information given of the proposed Company."

"I believe the Government's intentions were good, but generally speaking I may say that I am not in favor of combines, as I understand where they have been established they have not worked satisfactory to the public at large."

The above are merely brief extracts from the letters received by the Board of Trade. They are unanimous in their condemnation of the bond-guarantee proposal. The case could have been made stronger by more extended extracts from these and other of the letters received, would space permit as it will not today. We may add that among the letters received there appears not a single one which gives a full support to the scheme. The unanimity of the public condemnation is indeed most remarkable.

THE FINANCIAL ASPECT.

Our provincial finances are in a far from satisfactory condition. This has been proclaimed from the house tops from year to year by our rulers. It has been made the text of a succession of begging expeditions to Ottawa, telling always the same story that our revenues are inadequate to meet the pressing needs of the public service. Is it prudent at such a time to pledge the credit of the Province as an endorser of the bonds of the Dominion Packing Company, of which we know nothing beyond a bald prospectus furnished by the promoters? We have had deficit after deficit year after year. Is it under such conditions that our rulers should pledge our credit to unknown outsiders, and this without consulting the tax-paying public, and by a secret agreement, the text of which has been so far refused to the people?
