BIBLICAL EDUCATION CONFERENCE—Despite the heavy rains of last night people from long distances motored to Sackville to be present at the opening meeting of the Biblical Education Conference. Dr. P. B. Meyer who is known throughout the world as an outstanding preacher and writer, gave the opening address. Although over fourscore years Dr. Meyer's mind seems as clear and penetrating as in the heyday of his ministry. Few men have been able to retain the interest of large audiences at his time of life, but whether in his own great city of London or abroad he exercises an influence that causes multitudes to listen eagerly to his vital and vivid messages. He is to speak twice daily throughout the conference. Other speakers are Dr. Wm. C. Poole, of London, England, and Mr. Alfred Naseef, of Jerusalem, Palestine. Each train brings an addition to the already splendid attendance. The morning meeting was a brief introduction after which Mr. Naseef explained the geography and topography of the Holy Land.

He has had varied experiences as an Oriental merchant and gets all his information at first hand. Dr. Meyer was in his happiest mood and seemed to be enjoying himself thoroughly as he gave his message in almost informal way. He continues his course of studies every morning for the next ten days.
