World Records Shattered By U. S. Athletes

(By Alan Gould, Associated Press Sports Editor)
 STANFORD STADIUM, Palo Alto, Calif., July 17.—Topped off dimly by a skyward pole vault of 14 feet 4 3/8 inches by Bill Graber of Southern California for a new world record with the National A. A. U. championship, closed with thrills yesterday.

On the way to this spectacular climax of the two day battle for places on the American Olympic team, four world records were surpassed, a fifth equalled, and Olympic records bettered in 10 of the 18 events. These dramatic features stood out:
 A courageous come-back by big Ben Eastman, Stanford's storm-centre of the big show, as he finished second in the 400 metre run, two yards behind Will Carr of Pennsylvania, who raced to victory and a new world record of 49.9 seconds.
 A sensational double victory in the sprints by the rangy marquette university negro, Ralph Metcalfe, who twice led his dusky rival Eddie Tolan, of Detroit, and George Simpson, former Ohio State star, to the tape in 10.6 for the 100 metres, equaling the Olympic record, and in 21.5 for the 200 bettering the Olympic standard.
 Failure of Gene Venzke, eastern ace and holder of the world indoor one-mile record to make the team as he finished fourth, just outside the fold, in a dazzling 1500 metre final, won by Norwood Pen-

rose Hollowell of Harvard in 3 minutes, 52.7 seconds, surpassing the American and Olympic records.
 A flock of other upsets in which Frank Wykoff of southern California and Emmett Topplin of New Orleans both failed to make the 100 metre line up and were forced to be content with being picked for the 400 metre relay team and such national champions as Herman Erik of Los Angeles, in the shot put, Ed Flanagan of Los Angeles, in the hammer throw, and James Demers of Los Angeles, in the javelin throw, all failed to make the team.
 A series of form reversals, aided by extension of the first day's qualifying list, in which Kenneth Churchill of the Olympic club, San Francisco, came back from sixth place to win the javelin throw with 222.31 feet, surpassing the Olympic record, and Dick Barber of Southern California emerged from seventh position to top the broad jumpers at 25 feet, 4 3/8 inches.
 Two of the four world record performers were registered on Friday and these stood throughout the finals as John Anderson of the New York A. C., clinched his triumph in the discus with a throw of 165.54 ft. and his giant club-mate, Leo Sexton, maintained his big margin in the shot put with 52 feet 8 inches.
 Officials rulings, growing out of the changes in qualifying rules, created confusion and hickering before the final trials were run off.

Will Extend Welcome To Delegates

MONTREAL, July 17.—(By The Canadian Press)—Canada's greeting to the British, South African and Indian delegates to the Imperial Economic Conference will be presented at Quebec tomorrow afternoon by three Cabinet ministers. Hon. Arthur Sauve, Postmaster General, Hon. Alfred Duranleau, Minister of Marine and Hon. C. H. Cahon, Secretary of State, left here tonight to meet the Empress of Britain at Quebec and extend the Dominion government's welcome.

Fear For Safety Of Missing Airliner

SANTIAGO, Chile, July 17.—(A. P.)—Fear for the safety of a missing trans-Andean airliner and her nine passengers mounted today as no word of the ship came out of the winter-bound Andes.
 Another discouraging development was nasty weather, which blocked a search by plane from Santiago, Chile and Mendoza, Argentina. The airliner disappeared somewhere along the 150 miles of fog, wind and snow ridden mountains between these two cities yesterday at 8:40 a. m.
 The liner, a pan-American-Cargo ship, was last seen flying eastward over Cuevas, 10 miles from the Chilean border. She had just come through the dangerous Chacabuco Pass, 10,000 feet in the Andes. Nothing was seen of her after that.
 Despite bad weather conditions, however, a party of expert mountain climbers equipped with skis left Las Cuevas by automobile today in the hope that they might find the ship down somewhere along the trans-Andean railway line, but it was admitted their hunt was akin to for a needle in a haystack.
 The most favorable factor in the disappearance was the fact that the airliner was piloted by Charles J. Robinson, chief of the Trans-Andean division of the Pan-American-Grade line, and known as one of the best Transcontinental flyers in the business. He was substituting for the regular pilot.

Recognition May Result From Strike

MONTREAL, July 17.—(By The Canadian Press)—Recognition of the United Clothing Workers of Canada by two large manufacturers of men's clothing was expected to result from a strike here. It was anticipated in Labor circles tonight that the matter would be settled early this week.
 The firms concerned are the S. and G. Clothing Company and the Freedom Company, 500 of whose employees have been on strike for some days, seeking to have the newly organized Canadian union recognized. Previously the firms only dealt with the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America, an international body with New York headquarters.

Herriot's Speech Throws Light On Accord

PARIS, July 17.—(A.P.)—The Nationalist Journal Des Debats declares Premier Edouard Herriot ought to make clear the exact significance of the Franco-British accord, saying that thus far there have been too many glittering generalities about it.
 The newspaper's own interpretation of the much-discussed agreement was that it did not seem to be a renewal of the entente cordiale but rather a sort of consultative union under British auspices.
 Friday's officially sponsored statement that it would be absurd to contend that, under the accord, Britain had no right to make a new debt arrangement with the United States without consulting France, failed to put an end to discussion of the agreement with the London Government.
